OUR CONTRIBUTIONS TO HOME AND OVERSEAS MISSIONS AND OTHER CHARITIES.

Extracts from letters we have received from the headquarters of the various Societies and Charities supported by Hambledon Church were included in last month's magazine. We promised to include extracts from other letters in a future issue.

RUANDA MISSION (Church Missionary Society)

"Thank you very sincerely for your gift for the Mission
Please pray with us that the Lord may be able to use this mark of
your fellowship to His glory. Our folk out there need all the backing of those of us at home Since mid-December there have
been serious disturbances in Rwanda, and some of our Church
members have been imprisoned, and some killed. The borders
are closed, letters are delayed, and in some places members have
been confined to their stations."

THE MISSION OF HOPE (A voluntary Mission, helping unmarried mothers and homeless children)

"Thank you so much for sending the wonderful gift of £22. 10. 0. from the collections on Christmas Day. We are so grateful to everyone who has so kindly had a share in making this gift possible. We would specially value your prayers at this time for the many young women who are with us, that they may turn to the Saviour in their need". (During the past twelve months 99 unmarried mothers entered the Home, of these 55 were under 20 years of age.)

FEGAN'S HOMES (For Homeless Children

"We are indeed grateful for the kind and generous gift of £25. I should be grateful if you would pass on to all concerned, our thanks and say how encouraged we are by this generous token of their interest in our work. Since my visit to Hambledon (Church Fellowship) some time ago, we have now completed the reorganisation of our work... We are greatly encouraged by the success of the smaller Homes and the improvement in the happiness and spiritual welfare of the children.

KESWICK CONVENTION MISSIONARY HOSPITALITY FUND.

(Miss C. Ruth Henman, a member of our congregation, is one of the Secretaries of this Fund. Grants are made to Missionaries home on leave which enables them to attend the Convention held at Keswick every summer).

WHY NOT JOIN THE CHOIR ?

Three reasons have been given by members of our congregation :-

- 1) I cannot come regularly to practices and services.
- 2) Not enough room in the choir stalls.
- 3) I cannot sing.

The third answer is really only valid if you are tone deaf

and can only croak. You are good enough to try a spell in the choir if you sing in your bath or hum one of the 'Top Twenty' while dusting the sitting-room. We don't expect experienced singers, and we are not so much looking for them.

As for answers 1). and 2). the whole point of building up the choir's numerical strength is to make, in effect, two or even three separate choirs, so that if each individual member attends only once every two or three weeks there will be sufficient numbers present on each occasion to sing the services in a worthy fashion. You can think of it as a "rota" system, and clearly answers 1). and 2). cease to have any meaning under such a system.

We need more boys and girls, and more ladies and gentlemen. Several existing choir members can only sing in the choir every few weeks, but how valuable they are! And they enjoy it! Is it asking too much to double their numbers? Please don't wait to be asked personally, and don't bother to find out whether we need you. We do. Just come to a practice on a Friday at 7.15 p.m.

This recruiting campaign has already had some success in the soprano line. Miss Mary Parker finds time in her busy life to "face the music", and Mrs. Joan Herman joined the choir during Lent. From a family who only came to live in Hydestile a few weeks ago. Geraldine Young is already wearing a choir robe. To these three welcome. Let there be more, please!
