ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING - Short Report.

This was held at the Rectory on Tuesday, March 16th, 1965.

#### Election of Churchwardens .

The Rector thanked the Churchwardens for their valued services in the past year, and Mr. C.A. Chapman was re-appointed Rector's Warden, and Mr. C.A. Cronhelm re-elected People's Warden.

<u>Diocesan Conference Representative</u> - Mr. H. M. Palmer was re-elected.

Ruri-Decanal Conference Representatives - Mrs Ayling expressed a wish to resign from this office, and she was thanked for her many years of service. Mrs. C.E. Carter was re-elected, and Mr. I.J. Adgie elected.

Parochial Church Council. All the above are ex-officio members

of the Council. The following were elected members of the Council by the meeting: Mr. S. Ayling, Miss E. F. Denny, Mrs. J. Dowson Mrs. D. Ellingson, Mr. D. Head, Miss M Parker, Mr. R. Sharpington, Mr. D G. C. Symonds, Mrs. M. Vacher, Mrs. E. Wieler, Mr. R G. Williams, Mr. W. W-Wynne.

Electoral Roll. The Secretary reported that there were now 208 names on the Roll.

 $\frac{Sidesmen}{of\ Messrs}$ . The present sidesmen were re-elected with the addition of Messrs. Harvey, Symonds and W-Wynne. The Rector thanked the sidesmen for all their help.

Presentation of Accounts. The Hon. Treasurer, Mr. C. A. Chapman, in presenting the Accounts stated that the income had risen from £2,776 in 1963 to £2,923 in 1964. We had been able to raise our contributions to Home and Overseas Missions to £1,377. He stated that the finances seem to be in a very satisfactory state. (A copy of the Audited Accounts is affixed near to the Church Door and we hope to include some of the details in a future issue of the magazine. Further extracts from letters sent to the Treasurer by the various Societies we support are included in this publication.). Miss Denny Free-Will Offering Secretary stated that the Offerings had risen from £1,238 in 1963 to £1,313 in 1964 (Tax recovered from £425 to £447). making a total of £1,760 in 1964). The Rector thanked the Treasurer and the F.W.O. Secretary for their greatly valued services to the Council. He also thanked the Hon. Auditor, Mr. J. B. Marriage, for his work. Mr. Marriage was re-elected as Hon. Auditor.

Fabric Report. This was presented on behalf of the Churchwardens by Mr. Chapman who stated that all was well with the church building, but some repairs to the pews were very necessary.

Rector's Report. Grateful thanks were expressed to all Church Officers for the help and encouragement given in the past year. Sir John H. Wenham is now our Hon. Lay Reader, and we are most indebted to him for his help in the Ministry. In a brief report it was stated that congregations had kept up well throughout the year and there had been good attendances at the Church Fellowship, the Women's Fellowship and the Sewing Meetings. Attendances at the Bible Study, commenced in 1964, were most encouraging and it is obvious that the studies

are much appreciated. Special mention was made of the indebtedness of the congregation to Mrs. Dowson for the use of her
courtyard as a Church Car-Park". Thanks were expressed to all
responsible for the care of the Church and Churchyard, members
of the choir and all who helped in the services, also the magazine
distributors and secretaries.

CHURCH FELLOWSHIP. At the March meeting Mr. T. Clennell of Cranleigh showed a large and appreciative audience his lovely colour transparencies of Scotland, the Western Isles. Mr. C. A. Chapman led a hearty vote of thanks and Sir John Wenham closed with prayer.

Extracts from letters from Missionary Societies and Charities supported by Hambledon Church (continued).

THE CHINA INLAND MISSION - News from the Field: - (The Mission is now working in Thailand, Indonesia, Hong Kong, Formosa, Vietnam, Laos, Japan, Singapore, and the Philippines.)

"The Rev and Mrs. Bob Harper are now on furlough, having completed a most encouraging term of service at Teluk Anson, the centre of our Anglican field. We are rejoicing that there has

been a growth on Asian leadership through the years - all the Sunday Schools, and Youth Fellowships are now indigenous. Just before leaving they had the joy of seeing a new church hall opened and five people baptised, three of whom came directly from heathen religions, one of whom was Headmistress of a Primary School. They would value prayer for the newly baptised, and confirmed members that there shall be growth in their Christian lives, and a reaching out for service.

The Bible Correspondence Course is quite a feature in the Far East, and our friends have been seeing the work expand quite a lot in Formosa and Malaya. In Malaya the course is run in Tamil, Chinese and English, and of course all the work of preparation, translation, marking etc., calls for a versatile staff, and many hours of work each day. Recently they have acquired a Tamil speaking man to help, and this is an answer to prayer. The constant prayer of our friends is that those who commence may go right through with the course, and the majority do."

#### KESWICK CONVENTION (MISSIONARY HOSPITALITY FUND)

Miss Ruth Henman, a member of our congregation, and one of the Secretaries of this Fund, writes:-

"Would you please convey to Hambledon Parochial Church Council our most grateful thanks for their gift of £10. 10. 0. to the Keswick Missionary Hospitality Fund. This will enable us to cover the full cost of accommodation for a missionary on furlough at the forthcoming Convention, July 10th - 17th. D. V., and I do not need to tell you how much it will be appreciated."
