## ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING

The Secretary of the Parochial Church Council has kindly sent a report of the meeting for inclusion in this issue of the magazine:-

# VESTRY AND ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING, HELD AT THE RECTORY. 13.3.67. 8.00 p.m.

The Rector opened the meeting with prayers.

VESTRY MEETING The Rector thanked Mr. Chapman
for his year's service as Rector's Warden, and
said he had asked him to continue in that
capacity. Mr. Chapman had agreed. Mr.
Hutchins proposed, and Mr. Ayling seconded, Mr,
Cronhelm as People's Warden. This was carried.
A.G.M.

Electoral Roll - the Secretary said that at this year's revision, the Roll stood at 195.

Accounts - Mr. Chapman presented and explained the Accounts copies of which were available for members. He said that our total income - £3,000 approximately - enabled us to send about £1,350 to home and foreign missions and other charities. This he felt was good for a parish with a small population (825 including Hambledon Homes, which has about 150 residents). Miss Denny said that there had been a further increase in contributions to the Free-Will Offering Fund, and a most welcome rise in Income Tax recovered on covenants.

The Rector thanked the Treasurers for all they had done in connection with the accounts. The Rector proposed and Mr. Alexander seconded that the accounts be adopted. This was carried.

Thanks were expressed to Mr. Clarke, the Hon. Auditor, who is leaving the parish, and the Secretary was asked to write to him. It was proposed by Mr. Chapman, and seconded by Mr. Roderick, that Mrs. Cronhelm be asked to undertake the duties of Hon. Auditor. Mr. Cronhelm said that she would be prepared to do this.

Dealing with the Church fabric, Mr. Chapman said that no substantial expenditure had been incurred during the past year. Sundry small

items such as faulty gutters had been dealt with, but nothing of a major nature.

Mr. Hutchins suggested replacement of the red curtain by the choirstalls, and Mr. Chapman said this would be done, together with the renewal of hymnbooks and psalters as necessary. The Rector thanked the Churchwardens for their care of the fabric.

Parochial Representatives of the Laity:The Diocesan and Ruri-decanal representatives
were to be the same as last year, but Mrs.
Carter had expressed her desire to resign from
the R.D.C. Mr. Adgie proposed and Mr. Williams
seconded that Mr. Roderick be elected, and this
was carried.

Sidesmen:— The morning sidesmen were reelected en bloc, with the addition of Messrs.
Gorringe and Marks, and the deletion of Mr. R.
Chapman. For evenings; Messrs. Ayling, Harvey,
Adgie and Symonds were re-elected.
Parochial Church Council:— The Secretary said
that the P.C.C. had met on four occasions during
the year, the main business being the repaving
of the path (now completed), the provision of
extra parking space by widening the road,
(under construction), and the repair of certain
pews, which, together with the provision of a
new door in the small vestry and toilet facilities, were under active consideration.
Rector's Report

The Rector said the attendance at services had been encouraging. The numbers at Holy Communion kept up well, despite the lapsing of newly-confirmed members, this being a problem common to churches everywhere. The Children's Church attendances had kept up. Thanks were expressed to all who assisted in the work of the Church. The sidesmen had done valuable

service in welcoming members of the congregation, particularly as ours was not an easy church in which to select space on entering - it is very helpful to be shown to a vacant pew. The work of Sir John Wenham, our Hon. Lay Reader, had been particularly valuable, and we are all grateful to him. Thanks were also due to the lessonreaders - many visiting preachers had remarked upon the clarity of the reading. We were all very grateful to the members of the choir for their faithful service, particularly to Mr. Hutchins, who had given forty years to this. It was good to see some young blood in the choir, and this was most welcome. Miss Jenny Hill was doing wonderful work in training the choir, and her organ voluntaries were much appreciated. Thanks were also due to Mr. & Mrs. Goad for their care of the church.

The church flowers were always beautifully done, and thanks are due to those who provide

and arrange them.

The church coach continued to provide a means of attendance for several members of the congregation who would otherwise find it impossible to come, and this was a very worthwhile provision. Parking continued to be a great problem, and were it not for the continued kindness of Mrs. Dowson in allowing the use of her courtyard, this would be insurmountable. The path, newly-paved, was a great improvement.

Referring to weekday activities, the Rector said that our Bible Study Group had a steady membership of 15 - 20, and is very welcome. Mr. Symonds had gone to a great deal of trouble in giving a series of studies on the life and character of Abraham and our thanks were due to him. The Church Fellowship, commenced some ten years ago, flourished, and a quite considerable

variation in the programme was contemplated for next year. The Church Outing, very capably arranged by Mr. & Mrs. Adgie, had been a great success, and we were all looking forward to the trip this year to Penshurst Place.

The Women's Fellowship was well attended, and much appreciated, - our thanks to Mrs. Grillo and others for opening their homes to us. The Sewing Meeting and embroidery class met regularly at Mrs. Chapman's home, and were continuing to equip the church with the beautiful kneelers made by the ladies - and even some of the men. Some 80 of these had been provided, several are still in course of manufacture, and some 40 more are still required. Grateful thanks to all who help in this.

The Garden Party was held on Whit Saturday, and was very successful. Due partly to the machinations of the Government in altering the date of Whitsun holiday, the party this year was to be held on the first Saturday in

September - September 2nd. Sterling work was being done by our Magazine

distributors, and our thanks were due to them, and also to Miss Stone, who month by month brandishes her stapler and assembles all the bits in correct order - a task of no mean

magnitude.

The School Managers met regularly, and thanks were rendered to them. Mrs. Hoey, appointed last year, left after two terms, her place being taken by a supply teacher.

The Churchyard, under the care of Mr. Goad, and Mr. Chesson, was kept beautiful, and we

are very grateful to them.

Referring to the Overseas weekend, to be held in July, the Rector appealed for hospitality for visitors from West Africa, this being -6-

the main interest of our Diocese. Last year, visitors were made welcome at a reception given by the Bishop at Farnham Castle, and it was hoped that this would be repeated.

Finally, the Rector said, he and Mrs. Elton wished to express their thanks to their parishioners for all the help and encouragement

they had been given during the year.

Mr. Cronhelm rose, and on behalf of all the congregation, said he wished to extend our thanks and best wishes to the Rector and Mrs. Elton for all their devoted work in the parish.

There being no other business, the meeting ended with prayer at 9.15 p.m. Refreshments were then served.
