CAR PARKING AT CHURCH SERVICES

We ought to try to use in the first place the widened roadway immediately opposite the church. There is only limited room there and we can use it most economically if cars are parked not parallel to the read but nose in to the bank, obliquely, at an angle.

When this is full, we are allowed also to use the open courtyard which is part of Court Farm. It is only through the kindness of Major and Mrs. Major that we can do so, and we are most grateful to them for continuing to allow it. Members who need to park their cars in their private courtyard should (i) Avoid blocking the way into the garages there

(i) Avoid blocking the way into the grass verge (ii) Avoid spoiling the edges of the grass verge

(iii) Be sure not to damage the gates or gate posts when entering or leaving.
