Mr. "Mac Bolton and his wife Sheila had hardly arrived here last summer before we began to make important use of them in leading the team which takes charge of Sunday Club.

Now for Mac there is a wider ministry. He came to us from other Dioceses as an established Reader (Lay Reader, as the office used to be called) and at the request of the Rector and of the Church Council the Bishop has given authority for him to exercise this office here in Lambledon. The formal licensing service will be held in (fuildford in May, but the authority to officiate starts now.

He comes to us very well qualified. He took a Mechanical Sciences degree and then a Teacher's Certificate at Cambridge; followed this with a Diploma in Public and Social Administration at Oxford, and a M.Fhil. degree in social psychology at Sussex University; and he is now engaged in Management Training at Roffey Park, Horslam. He was first trained to be Reader in Exeter Diocese in 1956. Then when he went to Uganda he was licensed Reader there under the Archbishop from 1958 to 1963. Since then he has been Parochial Reader in the Dioceses of Chester and Chichester, and finall; Diocesan Reader in Oxford Diocese before coming here.

We are very glad indeed to have his help now, not only in the training of our older children, but also sometimes in our Church strvices, and pray that God may guide and use him to bring His blessing to us all in the years ahead.

ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING IN THE VILLAGE HALL THURSDAY 13 APRIL 8.0 pm

Last year numbers were so large that we ran short of chairs, but we will make sure that this does not happen this year.

Of course, it is ELECTION TIME when we shall choose our Churchwardens, some of our Church Council, and Sidesmen. It is also REFORTS TIME when we hear about the fabric of the Church and of its property; about our financial affairs and giving outside; and about the decisions and work of the Church Council. At every stage there is opportunity for church members to ask questions or to make suggestions. After a cup of tea and a short break the evening closes with the Rector's Review, which is illustrated by colour transparencies loaned by various members. The evening gives probably the best opportunity of the year to gain a good understanding of how things are going, and we hope that once again we shall have the hall full.

PARISH FELLOWSHIP

At the March meeting Major R.P.A. de Berniere-Smart gave a most illuminating talk on the work of The Shaftesbury Homes, of which he is General Secretary. There were slides to illustrate graphically from both modern times and from earlier days, and it was plain to see that though social conditions have changed enormously in over a century of the Society's life, the desperate unhappiness and lostness of many boys is as acute as ever. Some of the hopes for the Society's future development were set before us, and its need for further funds if these are to be realised.

It was felt by the Church Courcil at a recent meeting that we need to remind curselves that the "car park" in the courtyard near the Church is neither church property, nor public property; it is the private property of Major John and Mrs. Major, and it is only by their kindness and courtesy that we are able to use it at times of public services. It are most grateful to them. Several further points were made:

1. We should drive our cars in aid out slowly. There have been times when the gate was damaged, and gravel spurted over the surrounds.

2. We ought to park (even if arriving late!) with consideration, not only so that other cars can get

away, but also well clear of garage entrances.

3. Where drivers plan to stay to a following
Communion Service, it may be lost for them to park
in the lane if possible so that they do not hem in
others who may be coming away after the earlier service.

To this we can add that in any case it would be right to use available parking in the lane first; to keep the turning space at the top clear; and to park cars at an angle, nose well in to the hedge, so that many cars can be accommodated without any being hemmed in.

PERSOMALIA

Kenneth Cole lived in Hambledon for many years. In speaking of him at the cremation of March 14th Canon Oldham recalled his great competence as a London lawyer in earlier years, and indeed his mind was clear right up to the end. Physically, however, he had been very frail for many years past, and his heart condition required him to keep almost entirely at home and to live very quietly indeed. His days were, however, occupied with reading and television, and only in the last day or two did he take to his bed before dying peacefully in his sleep. He was 71. To his sons we send our sympathy now.

"PUNCH" MAY

Punch May came to Hambledon early in his married life and had lived here for about 50 years. He served in the 1914-1918 war, and some will remember him in the Home Guard in the last war. But it is especially in farming that we think of him, and with great respect; for he was one of the few remaining "old countrymen" who knew the old machinery and the old skills. He was able to give a lifetime of experience in cultivation and a special touch with animals in several local farms, not least at Feathercombe Farm, and, after his supposed retirement, in the gardens of Hydon Farm and Court Vale. Many will miss his sturdy independence and sense of humour. It was a happiness to him that he was able to spend his last weeks in his own home, in his own village, and among his own people. We specially remember Mrs. May, who nursed him attentively, and the family now.
