Everything depends upon the togetherness and confidence: and neither is possible if as we sing we are not sure how to fit the words to the tune. The only answer to this is to use a "Pointed Psalter" where we can read not only the words, but also (with a but of practice) the pointing"...i.e. how the words are fitted to the tune.

As long ago as last summer the P.C.C. decided to increase our small stock of psalters for congregational use. Unfortunately the one we use is out of print and cannot be purchased; but we have been seeking in various places to obtain some second-hand, hoping that we could thus avoid changing to a different pointing. Now, alas, we have come to realise that we are not likely to get any further copies of our existing psalter.

Before abondoning this and buying a new stock with a different pointing, the P.C.C. suggests a trial period when we put the 30 copies we have into the hands of those members who can already "read" them. After all, 30 confident singers, well together, could easily keep the whole congregation in step!

So during April and May the pointed psalters will not be scattered sparsely in the pews. Instead they will be kept at the back of the church, Would those members who can read and make use of them please ask for one as they come into church, and return it there after the service. We hope that in this way all 30 copies in our slender stock will be well and effectively used. The P.C.C. will be able to judge how well things go, and decide later whether any further steps need to be taken.

May we add one further thing? Would any members who would be willing to kearn how to "read" the pointing also please arm themselves with a copy. There are guiding instructions in the Preface of the book, and these could slowly be assimilated. YOU TOO COULD BECOME A CONFIDENT SINGER!
