"Thank you so much for your letter forwarding to us the contents of two collecting phials. We gladly enclose herewith our official receipts for your kind passing on to the friends concerned. At the same time, will you please assure them of our very warm thanks for their kind help of our Work.

"Letters from the Field often remind us of the timeliness of our remittances. Especially was

this so in the case of a grant sent to help maintain children whose parents are in a Government Leprosy Home in Portuguese Guinea, and which came as a very real answer to the prayers of the missionary in charge and the children. The Mission's grant, for an increased amount, arrived on the very day when the stock of rice gave out, and there was no money to buy more."

N.B. Our Hon. Secretary for the Leprosy Mission has resigned on account of ill-health. We thank him for all the help he has given to the work in recent years and wish him renewed health. HAMBLEDON PARISH COUNCIL

Annual Parish Council Meeting

A. E. Wieler Esq. was elected Chairman and W. E. Head Esq. as Vice-Chairman. The plants for stocking the village pond had been delivered, and the Chairman agreed to arrange for the planting over the week-end. The extra cost of having 6"

land drains in place of 4" ones was agreed too, also to have the ditch by the pond cleared out, so that the water could drain away from the common.

The future use of Hambledon Homes was discussed (the Surrey County Council had stated that they would not require the property after 1976). Col. Stedall was to be asked to keep the Parish Council informed of any future developments. The parish accounts for 1969-70 were accepted subject to audit. It was proposed to support the 70 NO LITTER campaign, and to appoint a representative. It was also agreed to have the track in front of Paddock Close repaired; estimates to be obtained.

Planning applications as affecting the parish were examined, and it was agreed to offer no comment. It was reported that the H.R.D.C. had agreed to place waste-paper baskets at Lane End seat and bus shelter. Mrs. M. Hutchins and C. A. Chapman Esq. were re-appointed the Council's representatives to the Hambledon C. of E. Primary School, and the Godalming County Grammar School respectively.

A strong letter of protest to be sent to the Bus Co. over the uncertainty of No. 47 route buses, especially those affecting the young school children; this was in support of the Head Teacher's (Mrs. Grieves) complaint. H.R.D.C. to be asked if any further progress had been made regarding the scheme of Common Regulations. Next meeting arranged for 17.7.70.

### WOMEN'S INSTITUTE REPORTS

Hambleton Women's Institute met on Wednesday, June 10th at Mrs. Ellingson's house, and the first business was to thank her for her hospitality, which was specially welcome on such a hot and sunny day, and it was a delight to wander round her green and restful garden when the meeting was over.

After the formal business, MRS. DOSSET gave a talk and demonstration on KNITTING FINISHES. She stressed the need for careful putting together of the beautiful knitting so many people now do, and showed various ways of making flat and almost invisible seams; neat and firm button-holes, and shapings without holes. She brought samples to illustrate her talk, answered questions and gave many useful hints on pressing, putting in zips and sewing on buttons. Mrs. Crowhurst proposed a warm vote of thanks.

Mrs. Hardy won the competition for a garden in a saucer, and Mrs. Jeffrey won the raffle.

Hambleton Women's institute met on Wednesday, July 8th, at Feathercombe, by kind invitation of Mrs. Wieler and Miss Parker, who were warmly thanked at the beginning of the afternoon by Mrs. Geoffrey Cooke, the President.

After the business, Mrs. Little, Chairman of the Surrey W.I. International Committee, spoke for a few minutes about the work of the Guildford International Council. It works for better international understanding, and welcomes the many foreigners who come to work or study in Guildford and the surrounding areas. There are about 2,000 and every October a Welcome Week is held in Guildford, which includes a Civic Reception, a visit to the Surrey Advertiser and many social events when

residents can meet some of the visiting foreigners and make contacts, which often last for the time they are here. Mrs. Little introduced Mrs. Prasad, a doctor from Bihar and the wife of a doctor working at Epsom General Hospital. Mrs. Prasad could not speak fluent English, but brought with her many beautiful saris, and showed members how to put them on, and how to wear them. Mrs. Hardy and Mrs. Wilson paraded in the richly coloured and embroidered saris and were much admired. Each one contains six yards of Cloth, and may cost £60 or more.

Mrs. Ellingson thanked Mrs. Little and Mrs. Prasad on behalf of the Institute.
