WOMEN'S FELLOWSHIP

The last fellowship meeting for this session
was held on the 22nd June, when we welcomed a
number of friends from the Godalming Baptist
Church as our guests and three of the ladies from
Hambleton Homes.

Miss Mary Hayward, S.R.N., from Uganda spoke
on Psalm 31 verse 15, and referred briefly to the
Burundi situation and all the suffering caused by

tribal warfare as reported in the national press on several occasions. She then proceeded to speak of much blessing that was taking place among a number of girls in the neighbouring country of Rwanda, and then told us of her many varied experiences as Matron of a multi-racial preparatory school in Uganda, where no colour bar mars the relationship between the African, Asian and European boys and girls of which there are one hundred in the school. She kept us enthralled with stories about them and even at such a young age many were finding Christ as their Saviour.

Mrs. Ellingson, who visited the school two years ago and knew Miss Hayward personally, gave the vote of thanks. Tea followed and then we were invited by our Hostess to wander round her lovely garden and so ended a happy afternoon of friendship and fellowship.

HOME AND OVERSEAS MISSIONS AND CHARITIES
Extracts from letters of thanks for support (cont.)

South American Missionary Society

The Society's committees and staff have been deeply grateful for the increased prayer support which has been given to the work during the past year, and we thank you for your share in this and for being, as it were, part of the answer to prayer by your financial help.

Sometimes we have to pray, figuratively speaking, in the dark. Evidently the Christians in Trinidad, a suburb of Asuncion in Paraguay, don't believe in literally praying in the dark - the church members have just raised the money to instal electric light in their little wooden church, and

one member commented "Now we can plan nights of prayer!".

Elsewhere in Paraguay 50 prisoners (the entire complement of the town jail) made professions of faith in Christ during an Evangelism in Depth meeting, whilst in the Chaco the Paraguayans living on the ranches are benefiting greatly from the studies they are doing in connection with Evangelism in Depth.

There is a great need for key people to fill three vacancies in the Chaco - general oversight, educational and medical. Please continue to pray with us, and with the young churches of Paraguay, Argentina, Chile and Brazil, that all our needs, and theirs, will be supplied and that the Light of Life may shine in many hearts during this coming year.

Dr. Barnardo's

As a voluntary organisation, Dr. Barnardo's relies largely on the generosity of its friends to enable it to continue its work for deprived children. Increasingly we are working with children in their own homes with the aim of preventing the situation ever being reached where it is necessary for a child to come into residential care. Residential care is always a "second best", but for some - particularly those with physical, mental or social handicaps - there is often no choice, and these we help in one of our 100 residential homes, schools or special care units.

HAMBLEDON WOMEN'S INSTITUTE
