THE RECTOR WRITES

Every tenth year the Bishops of the Anglican churches throughout the world come together for the "Lambeth Conference". The present conference is being held in the University of Kent from July 22 to August 13. It is the first to be residential, and over 400 Bishops, from Africa, Asia, and the Americas as well as from the Commonwealth, will be there. May I commend it to your prayers.

Matters of importance to be considered include:-Training for the Ministry, and its future. It is chiefly the financial problem of paying for churches and for clergy to staff them in small populations (much more than the dwindling supply of men) that has led to widespread amalgamation of parishes. The number of clergy is being cut down. Some feel the type of minister needed and the training he receives must change. What is God's will here? The Ordination of Women. We are all aware of varied views in the churches, both as regards the rightness of the principle, and as to how far such a move would be universally welcomed. What is God's will? Anglican relations with other Churches. Thank God that the spirit between the denominations in recent years has been transformed, and is often now warm and co-operative indeed. We need now to move on to official recognition of each others ministries; and that has made only slow progress. Pray that God

Will show the right way.

Beyond all this, pray for a fresh touch of God's hand, to re-establish faith in Him, and confidence in his truth, and for the renewal of love for Him, not only among the Bishops, but among us all.

Ted was gardener there at the time, and so began, in the goodness of God, the growing friendship which led on later to a most happy marriage. They were married by Canon Seymour in 1942, so that Elsie had to say goodbyo to her husband until the war was over. After the armistice they moved to Oakhurst, and there she made a home of peace for 30 years, beautiful in the things which matter most.

We shall remember her with much pleasure as a friend and neighbour, as a member of the Women's Institute, and of the Women's Fellowship, and as a worshipper without fail every Sunday evening. She was always the same, unruffled, kind and generous (she always thought and spoke kindly of others), and uncomplaining even when her illness latterly brought her much pain to bear. We are thankful that she was able to end her days here in peace, and in her own home, and without fears and distress. To Ted especially, and indeed to all the Jeffery family, we send our love now.
