THE RECTOR WRITES

It was a great shock to us all to hear of the sudden death from a heart attack of our Bishop, David Brown, He was 60. He had gone to London to chair a committee at Church House, Westminster, when he collapsed, and he died before reaching hospital.

His B.D. course at London University was interrupted by war service with the R.A.F. (where incidentally he met our Warden Peter Roderick). His earlier years in the ministry were spent serving the Church Missionary Society in the Sudan, where he became profoundly influenced by his contacts with the Muslim world. He returned to England to parishes in Bromley and Herne Bay, and in 1973 was made Bishop of Guildford.

We remember the week end he gave to us in Bambledon in 1976, and appreciated the warm friendliness of his manner, and his simplicity in worship. He sought to be a bridge builder, between Church and secular world, between the great religious faiths, and between denominations - and the recent narrow failure of the Covenanting Proposals to secure the required two-thirds majority

deeply disappointed him.

There is to be a memorial service for him in

September.

Tray specially for his widow, who has herself had sickness and pain to bear. Tray too for God's guidance and over-ruling in the appointment of a successor.

ACTION AFRICA '82

In August this year I'm going to Africa with ine Africa Evangelical Fellowship (AEF) a missionary society sending people to mainly Southern Africa. Having now finished university at Bristol, I very much wanted to do something positive for God, but I wasn't sure quite what. I heard about this trip to Africa (or more precisely Zimbabwe and Botswana) called "Action Africa" last November, and felt that this was something I could perhaps do. After thinking and praying things through, I applied and was accepted. There are nine people going, ranging from 18-22. with a leader from AEF. We are spending six weeks in Africa and will be doing mary different and challenging activities from painting a clinic and bookshop to organising a youth camp. So things will be quite hectic over the time we are there. During our stay we will be staying with AEF missionaries, and meeting local

churches. Our trip has been very well planned, and we shall cover most of Zimbabwe and the north west corner of Botswana in our travels. we snall also have an opportunity to see some of the animals, and the Victoria Falls. It will be vinter-spring time there, one of the nicest times of the year, with pleasant temperatures during the day, and quite cold at night. It should be an exciting and enjoyable time certainly very interesting meeting others from a very different culture, but who also know and love God. I look foward to telling you about

it when I return.
