My dear Friends

I have just been watching the new England Cricket Captain being beseiged by small boys asking for this autograph, which he very patiently gave to them. In John 6:35, Jesus says "... I am ..." The very autograph of the Almighty. In Exodus 3:14, we read God said to Moses, "I AM WHO I AM", go to the Children of Israel and say "I AM has sent me to you". When Jesus uses the same autograph, in John 8:58, the Jews recognised the divine significance of it and were all for stoning Him for blasphemy; but He who "thought it not robbery to be equal with God" (Phil. 2:6) thought it not forgery to use his signature. How wonderfully He attached it to the "I Am " what? supply of our needs. Seven times it comes in St John's Gospel, 6:35, 8:12, 10:7, 10:11, 11:25, 14:6, 15:5. It is as if we are offered a signed blank cheque to be filled in by us for the sum which shall be required. "I Am ... the Bread of Life; the Light of the World; the Door; the Good Shepherd; the Resurrection and the Life; the Way; the Vine; and whatever else It is the signature that gives validity you need. to the promise in the Royal Bank of Heaven, "according to His riches in glory by Christ Jesus" (Phil. 4:19).

May we not fail to endorse the cheque by our faith and appropriation and live on the proceeds.

SURREY VOLUNTARY SERVICE COUNCIL

The Council have asked us to draw attention to the services at present offered to villages and seeks to promote the use of these services and amenities; one of the most fundamental of these is, of course, the village post office.

In 1987 the Post Office ruled that offices transacting less than 50,000 units would, when the service changed hands, become Community Offices, opening for only limited part-time hours. This might lessen the viability of the service as well as inconveniencing the villagers.

As the all-important term '50,000 units' does not really mean much to the average villager, we have provided a breakdown (by courtesy of Dorset Community Council) of exactly what number of units the most frequent transaction represents. In this way it is possible to see which service provides the greatest assistance to the local post office:


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ST PETER'S FLOWER FESTIVAL * 9/10 JULY

SIMON MABLEY

It is good to have Simon back with us in Hambledon now that he has finished his two-year secondment to Edwardes College, Peshawar, Pakistan, where he has been working with the Church Missionary Society.



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We were privileged to hear Simon give an illustrated talk in Church during the Evening Service on Sunday 24 July on the work that he has been doing and he has kindly contributed some thoughts to help us to pray more effectively for Pakistan and its people Often when we are asked to pray for the world it is hard to go beyond "and please Lord bless Asia". I'm sure it is batter if we can be more specific in our prayers so I thought I would suggest three ways in which we can pray for Pakietan and what is happening there.

It is very difficult to become a Christian in Pakistan because of the sacrifices that the decision inevitably involves. You have to be prepared to lose your job, family, friends and sometimes even your life if you make a public confession of your faith. We can pray for all of those people who are in that position now, and the many who although believe in their hearts feel unable to say so repenly.

In the north of Pakistan there are three remote valleys in which the Kalash people live. There are about 2,000 of them and they believe in a variety of gods and until recently have been untouched by Islam. In the last few years jest tracks have been built out to these valleys and this has brought with it the influence of Islam. The Vycliffe Bible Translators are currently working on a version of the Gospels in the Ealash language and so we can pray for the people working on the project and those who will be taking the Gospel to these valleys.

Pakietan is in some turmoil politically at the noment as the Government has been recently dissolved. The country faces many problems with civil unrest and the Afghan situation, and the coming elections will be a time of change where it will be important, if the country is not to some more and more fundamentally Islamic, that they are held fairly and democratically.

I hope that these thoughts give some idea of the things that are happening in Pakistan, and also encourage you to find out about and pray for other countries in the world.
