At 10.30 am on 17th November we began to gather at the Rectory for coffee prior to a stimulating programme of News and Views. It soon became clear that if women's Day becomes more popular the Rectory will need extension. At 11.30 am with every seat occupied we settled down to hear a very moving "tape" from Mrs Pytches, who spoke of the agonising decision her husband had made to resign his Bishopric of Bolivia, Chile, and Peru, and their readjustment to a new life in an English Vicarage. Mrs Wilson then introduced Mr Locke, N.S.P.C.C. Inspector for this area, who gave a telling and sometimes distressing summary of the work being done by the Society. Mrs Lance told us how a visit to a young married friend with multiple sclerosis in Hydestile Hospital had led her to visit the ward regularly, and what challenging yet rewarding work this was. There followed another "tape", this time one that had been recorded without our knowledge at one of the 10.30 am Tuesday Bible Study groups. A cacophony of chatter ended with a well known voice giving away her crochet secrets! Do we really make all that noise? We hastened, to reassure the gathering that we do in fact sit down to serious study, and how meaningful this is. Mrs Hardy gave us a hilarious demonstration of what goes on in her class for 5-8 year olds in Sunday Club using home made puppets; and she showed us how to make a gorgeous character out of a screwed-up piece of newspaper, a paper bag, and a stick, who became Jeremiah in his pit! Mrs Gardner had brought a selection of Christian books for sale, and she gave us quick reviews of some she specially recommends, including "The Hiding Place", and books by Catharine Marshall.

During lunch of soup and sandwiches, we had the opportunity to inspect Mrs de Vere Green's superb collection of fans, and to ask her all about them.

Mrs wilson presided over an N.S.P.C.C. Christmas Card sale-table, and we were able to browse among the books brought by Mrs Gardner.

Promptly at 2 pm the afternoon session started with some transparencies and a film presented by Mrs Vacher showing snippets of Last February's Parish week End at Fairmile. This was followed by Miss Parker's review of the 60 years since the W.I. was started in Hambledon in 1917 when her mother was the first secretary. Mrs Hardy then gave us some more demonstrations of the aids used in Sunday Club including an ingenious T.V. show. wonder the attendance on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of the month at the Ractory is increasing. Many of us felt we would like to go too! Finally Mrs Collins, a cousin of Mrs Thompson, told us how she had helped an optician friend tour Southe n Africa, and fit poor African people with glasses to correct defective eyesight; and how this work is possible only because hundreds of pairs of un wanted glasses are collected from all over England and adapted for re-use. If you have any unwanted glasses or their cases they will be gratefully received at the Rectory. The day, attended by over 70 people, finished with tea and a silver collection for the N.S.P.C.C.

Gertrude Mary Hutchins

Nurse Hutchins died in mid November after a long illness bravely borne. She came to Hambledon as a trained nurse from Manchester in 1924, served at the old infirmary here for some years, then took up her main life's work as our District Nurse. As well as being a great reader, she found time in her busiest years for the Women's Institute, and to help in the village fetes and other activities of the Parish Council, and for socials for the troops. But it is expecially as district nurse that she will long be remembered and loved; cycling in all weathers, and often making several visits in a single day at times of special need. All this was in the days when most Hambledon people had no telephone by which they could keep in touch with the doctor, and no transport, so that she was, as one of our ladies put it, the "lifeline" for many.

Among the Bible promises she remembered and relied on was "I will never leave thee nor forsake thee", and this was a strength to her in the closing days.

To her husband, who nursed her devotedly at home,

we send our special greetings now.

PARISH COUNCIL NOTES - ISSUE NO. 8

One of the most important matters to be dealt with at the last meeting of the Parish Council was to co-opt a new member in place of Mr. George Freemantle, who had to resign for business reasons. It was unanimously decided after some discussion that Mr. Tom Grillo be asked to fill the vacancy. Mr. Grillo has since accepted this situation.

The Jubilee Committee, with some money left over from the celebrations, decided that a walnut tree be purchased and planted in an appropriate place as a reminder of the 1977 events. The Hon. Mrs. Winton Dean is to be asked to 'plant' the tree, and the ceremony will take place at midday on one Saturday towards the end of November. Further details will be published when the date is finalised.

Mr. Chesson has finished his work on the Wieler Pond using the mechanical digger; manual work will start again on Saturday mornings between 10 a.m. and noon. All volunteers will be very welcome, provided they come equipped with spades and wellies.

At long last the Wormley Lane nameplate has been erected, and we hope this will be of benefit to the people living along that road.

The Boundaries Commission will soon be discussing possible improvements to the parish boundaries - anyone who has a point to make on this subject should speak to the Chairman or any other member of the Parish Council. If suggestions could be put in writing, it would be helpful.

The Parish Council has been undertaking a review of bridleways within the parish, and have made application that a relatively short length of footpath on Hambledon Common be upgraded to become a bridleway. This would complete a large figure-of-eight circuit and enable riders to have their enjoyment without damaging footpaths.
