# RUANDA MISSION of the C.M.S.

"We are very grateful for the gift which you have sent and for all the faithful prayer and caring of our friends. It was just a year ago that Ruanda again came into the news as a fresh wave of terror suddenly began to sweep through the country. Along with other nationals, many Christians were called upon to suffer, and some to lay down their lives. For our missionaries too it was a tense and difficult time. Much prayer has been made for that stricken country but as we look back over the year we see how wonderfully God has heard and answered. We praise Him for the testimony of our brethren in suffering, and for the deliverance of the Church and country from worse trouble. . . . All of our missionaries are still at their posts, opportunities abound and recruits are still coming forward".
