THE RECTOR WRITES

Next month's magazine will give details of the special series of sermons and addresses for Lent, which begins during the first days of March.

I want here to write a few preliminary lines to introduce the mid-week course which is being planned for the five Wednesday evenings beginning 11 March (in the Rectory at 8.30 om, after coffee at 8 pm.). The general title will be ABLE TO TEACH OTHERS ALSO", from Paul's phrase in 2 Timothy 2, verse 1. I hope that every Christian among us will want not only to have his or her own personal faith well grounded and aught, but will in addition want to help others also. Cur friends and neighbours often have problems of faith, misunderstandings to be cleared up, obstacles to belief, which need time to unravel, and sympathy and understanding. We need to understand them, and we need to understand our faith. They may not always feel able to come to church at this stage, and if they do they may not always find their problem answered. The need is for every ordinary Christian (not just clergy and ministers) to be equipped to help ...able to teach others also.

The Lent mid-week series will look again at some of the basics of Christian belief, but looking at them through the eyes of others, and turning aside to think through the difficulties, and to seek to answer them. I hope that many of our members will make a point of setting these

evenings aside.
