We are most grateful to Tom and Rosemary Arden-White for their offer of the use of both their house and their video-recorder.

Please support this opportunity by coming yourself and thinking of others who might like to come and join with us. There may be some people not involved in our regular worship and study who may see this series as a way of taking a look at what the Christian faith could mean for them. Do invite them to come. The meetings will last for just an hour, from 8pm to 9pm.

For those who want to do some deeper study we shall be offering for sale, as a Lent book, Richard Loster's 'Celebration of Discipline' which has a link with the suggested theme and which has a foreward by David Watson. Those who read it may find it rewarding to make connections between the book and the video-tapes. I look forward to sharing with you in this time of learning.

THE GIDEONS

Testaments.

The fascinating and exciting story in the book of Judges in the Old Testament in which God whittled down an army of 32,000 men to a small dedicated band of only 300 which God used to rout the Midian hordes, was the inspiration for three Christian commercial travellers in Wisconsin USA in These men formed the Gideon association to provide Christian fellowship amongst businessmen, relying on Gideon's God and Gideon's secret weapon the "Sword of the Lerd". In 1903 an American Gideon on a visit to England took home with him the idea of placing Bibles in hotel rooms and so began the international ministry that to-day is operating in over 130 countries by more than 70,000 Gideons who distribute over one million Bibles and Testaments every two weeks. The work in the British Isles only commenced officially in 1949 and by 1984 there are over 220 branches putting the Scriptures into hospitals, hotels, motels, guesthouses, schools, police training centres, eventide homes, prison cells, borstals, and even into the cabins of passenger liners and on board civil aircraft. Gideons believe that the Bible is the inspired Word of God and that it's message is relevant to the problems of the critical days in which we live. All Gideons are members in good standing of their local Christian churches who meet together for Christian service and witness; they share the joy of their faith in Christ by personal testimony and by presenting copies of the Bible or the New Testament. The need throughout the world is so great and the hunger for God's Word so apparent that Gideons in the British. Isles have an increasing burden not only to ensure adequate Scripture distribution in the homeland but also to support financially the distribution of God's word in the many underprivileged and needy countries overseas. Because the work is carried out at branch level by local Christian business and professional men who do this work voluntarily in their spare time, every £1 donated is used

GUILDFORD DIOCESAN FAMILY LIFE GROUP

The meeting will then split into small groups to see in which areas the Church and in particular the Guildford Diocesan Family Life Group can be of help to step-families. LETTER FROM TEAR FUND:

A letter has been received from Tear Fund acknowledging the £150.00 sent to them following the Hunger Lunch held on Sunday 23 December. They report that they have been greatly encouraged by the tremendous response from Tear Fund supporters to the needs of the Ethiopian people. Tear Fund has just made an emergency relief grant of £20,000 to send 100 tons of grain to Ethiopia, 70 tons will be going to the Wolayta region of Sidamo, south of Addis Ababa, and 30 tons will go to the rorthern province of Eritrea, where only a few relief agencies are actively involved.

Tear Fund is working through SIM-AID, the relief and development arm of the Society of International Missionaries, which currently provides medical assistance and food for over 500 families in Wolayta, and more than 400 in Asmara. Two nurses supported by Tear Fund, Ruth Cordle and Nicola Sullivan, have gone to work at two feeding centres in Wolayta.

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Tear Fund have been committed to a number of relief and development programmes in Ethiopia over the last ten years, and this year Teεr Fund's aid has topped £300,000. The money is being used, through SIM-AID and the Kale Heywet ('Word of Life') Church, to fund large-scale well-drilling, water improvement and forestry projects. thus seeking to deal with the causes of suffering as well as the immediate effects.

Please pray for the people of Ethiopia - especially those who are suffering acutely from the effects of malnutrition and disease. Pray too for all who are working to bring heap and hope where it is most needed.

Letter from The Chaldren's Society following the £21.57 sent to them as a result of the recent half-yearly box opening:

Even though the Christmas season has passed us by very rapidly, it is still as important as ever that we continue to help ir as many cases of hardship and neglect as possible. The Children's Society currently operates 96 projects, homes and care centres in England and Wales and, although the type of project may vary, t there is one underlying reed for all of them; and that is the unerring help and support of all our friends, for which we are very grateful. It is only with the help of our kind su porters that we can continue to develop and expand our work.

Each year over 7,000 shildren receive our help, which is only made possible with the very generous efforts and prayers of our boxholders, donors, and of friends such as yourselves.
