WOMENS' FELLOWSHIP

The Womens' Fellowship met at Ellingsons on the 22nd November when we welcomed Mrs. Derek Parsons, the wife of the Chaplain, who gave an interesting talk on the history of King Edward School. She told us that when King Edward VI came to the throne there were many people homeless and poor, at one time cared for by the monastries, in the streets of London. The Lord Mayor supported the Bishop of London's plea to the young king that Bridewell Palace, formerly occupied by King Henry VIII and his Queen Catherine, should be made available to help with this problem. The King agreed, and in 1553 by a common charter he established three hospitals, Christ's Hospital for destitute children, St. Thomas's Hospital for the sick and aged, and Bridewell Royal Hospital, the forerunner of King Edward School, in which young people could be taught a trade. 'Bridewell' moved in 1830 to St. George's Fields, Lambeth, and in 1867 to Witley, by which time the name of King Edward's School was in use. In 1952 the school became co-educational Today the school continues to fulfil the terms of the Charter by providing boarding education for children who are in need of this. The 430 pupils include a large number whose parents are serving abroad in Government Service, as Missionaries and in other capacities.

CHURCH FELLOWSHIP

There was a large attendance for the December meetings of the Church Fellowship, opened by the Rector who welcomed the two speakers who needed no introduction, as they were, or had been, well-known residents in Hambledon.

First Major R.P.A. de Berniere-Smart, General Secretary of the Shaftesbury Homes, gave an intensely interesting talk on the history and work of this Society.

Today, Major de Berniere-Smart said, the most pressing need was for Hostels for the over 5,000 homeless London school-leavers who could so easily drift into a life of violence, crime and drug-taking. It was these homes run by Christians who care, that the new "Shaftesbury Hostel Scheme" hoped to provide.

The second part of the programme was given by Mrs. Nicholas Hosp (well-known here as Miss Poppette Sutton) who showed a fine cine-film of beautiful scenery and wild animals which she took on a recent tour in East Africa. The speakers were thanked by Mr. C.A. Chapman. Refreshments were served by Mrs. Hammond and Mrs. F. Jeffery.

HAMBLEDON C. of E. PRIMARY SCHOOL

As our readers will know, the Education Authorities have decided that this school should be closed as from September 1974. An appeal against this decision was sent to the Minister of Education by the School Managers, with a request that Hambledon School should remain open as a "First School" and that, in addition, there should be a Nursery Class. The Managers' request was refused by the Ministry, but we are continuing to fight against the closure order, and the Diocesan Council of Religious Education is giving us its full support. We are grateful to the Hambledon Parish Council for the support it has given us in our efforts.

We are informed that the proposed re-organization of primary schools in the Godalming area still stands, but that, due to a delay in completing the building programme, the present proposals will now not take effect until September 1975. This will not be the first occasion when delays in re-organisation have occurred. The fact is that Hambledon School will continue as a Primary School after next September. The Managers will not cease their efforts that it should remain open for an unlimited period and will welcome the support of parents, parishioners and all who are interested in preserving the life of our village.
