THE RECTOR WRITES .....

"The LORD is my shepherd...He gives me new strength..

#### EPHRAIM FREEMANTLE

The death of Ephraim Freemantle at the early age of 62 is a sad loss to us all. He was born at Rock Hill Farm and had lived in Hambledon all his life except only for the war years. He then served with the Royal Engineers, fought with the 14th Army in Burma, and was at Kohima, one of the fiercest battles of the whole war. After the war his business brought him in effect into touch with every home in Hambledon. We all knew him. What not all of us knew, however, was that behind the coal yard he arew the most delicate and beautiful orchids. He was indeed a great lover of growing things, and of living things too. What we all know was the warm, smiling, unruffled personality that we remember so well, and which won him so many friends. Many will remember, too, his unfailing readiness to help others, even at the cost of putting himself out. We send our sympathy now to all his relatives, and especially to his widow, and to George and Valerie.

Recovered well from their operations, PERSONALIA and discharged from hospital, are MR. HUMPHREY now safely home, and MR. JOHN ISTED staying for a while with his daughter convalescing. MRS. DUDMAN continues in Milford Chest Hospital, and is still far from well. MRS. GOAD is a good deal better than she was, at home. MR. LUFF of Paddock Close had a sudden severe circulation problem the effect of which was similar to a stroke, bringing partial paralysis and robbing him of speech. He is still vary ill in the County Hospital. MRS. TED JEFFERY of Oakhurst suddenly went into St. Luke's Hospital for an operation from which she is now beginning to recover. TALLA MACLACHLAN suffered an accident which, though mercifully it did her no serious injury, left her with some concussion which reeded a short stay in the County Hospital before some quiet days at home.

WEDNESDAY EVENINGS From the New Year until the Lent Course begins, the midweek meeting at the Rectory, on Wednesdays at 8.15 pm, will generally be at fortnightly intervals. Part of the evening will be for Bible Study, and it may help us now to adopt John's Gospel as a general theme. The Rector would introduce a passage as needed, then others could contribute questions or discussion if they wish (and only if they wish, for of course it goes without saying that no one would be expected to contribute unless they choose), There would also be part of the evening for prayer, for both parish and world needs. Sometimes events occur so that the sequence is not exactly fortnightly, so look out for the dates in the magazine each month, and even if you cannot come to all, come whenever you can, with your copy of John's Gospel. All are most welcome. The dates in January are 5th and 26th.

MAGAZINE COSTS For two years the magazine has been running at a loss. The very low charge of 2½p has been maintained for several years, while costs of printing and duplicating have risen sharply. Following the advice of a working party the P.C.C. has decided:

(i) That from January this year the cost of our parish duplicated notes shall be 3p per month. This is the smallest possible increase, much less than was suggested at the Annual Meeting last Spring.
(ii) That from early in this year we shall seek to do our own duplicating in order to remove the loss from our church expenditure. We have been able to acquire our own secondhand duplicating machine, and have the promise of some willing help each month, so that as soon as we are sure that all is ready we shall turn over to our own production.

To ensure publication on the last Sunday of the previous month, any news or material for the magazine should be in the Rector's hands by not later than, say, the 16th of that month.

## WOMEN'S FELLOWSHIP

It is always good to hear news of missionary work around the world, and in November we had Mrs. Ryland-Jones from Indonesia who gave an interesting account of the work in which she and her husband are involved out in Java with the Overseas Missionary Fellowship. She also showed colour transparencies of the country, people, and their customs, and fascinated us with samples of the beautiful materials processed by the people of Indonesia, and also with some of their silver craft. 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### PARISH COUNCIL NOTES - ISSUE No. 4

The Parish Council met on 14th January, with Major Mervyn-Smith, our representative on Waverley District Council, also present.

PARISH RATES Rising costs have made it necessary to increase the precept (our demand on the District Council as the Rating Authority) for 1977/78 to £750, which will result in a Parish rate of 0.6 pence. This is an increase of a tenth of a penny over the figure we have kept to for the past 2 years.

CUCKOO CORNER Nothing new has been heard since Waverley included the site among others submitted to the County Council as suitable for consideration as a gipsy caravan camp. It was noted however, that a Surrey County Council planning committee has recently objected to a proposal by Waverley District to provide a site near Elstead for 8 mobile homes for people on the council house waiting list, on the grounds that the site chosen is on the edge of a Green Belt village, and the development could harm the rural character of the area!

HAMBLEDON HOMES waverley Council policy committee will be considering the future of this site and the suggestions for the use of the ground and buildings which were put forward by the Parish Council recently. It seems unlikely that waverley will be able to take over the whole site, though they may wish to purchase some of the houses. Surrey County Council will probably have to offer the property for sale on the open market, with use restricted to institutional purposes.

HENRY SMITH'S CHARITY Vouchers for groceries or fuel were distributed to twenty-seven local residents before Christmas, from the grant received annualy from the Trustees. Please tell us if you know of someone you think should be included on the list for next Christmas.

REPRESENTATION ON THE DISTRICT COUNCIL The Boundaries Commission has arranged a meeting to discuss Waverley's revised proposals for district wards. Our Chairman, Mr Coleman, is attending to state Hambledon's objections to being linked with Chiddingfold to form a District ward.

FOOTPATHS & B. IDLE AYS Members of the sub-committee have walked several more paths and a report has been sent to the County dighways de artment. If you come across obstructions or notice damage to stiles or finger-posts, please inform Mr Sutton (Wormley 2807) or Mr Edwards (Wormley 3329).

MORNLEY IANE The District Council has again refused our request for street name plates, unless the Parish meets the whole cost - about £56. The Parish Council is objecting to this because it amounts in effect to double rating on the parish ratepayers.

DEST KEPT VILLAGE COMPETITION We are entering the competion as usual again this year, and having come quite close to winning last year we feel that a little extra effort all round could bring the winners shield to the village for the third time.

VILIAGE FOND A plan is in hand to clear and open up a small pond which exists among the trees above the main pond - though it is now overgrown. A sub-committee has been formed and is now looking for volunteers to help with the project. Mr Coleman (Wormley 2977) would be delighted to hear from anyone who would like to help with muscle, material or money - or even advice.
