WHAT HAPPENS ON WEDNESDAY EVENINGS?

We do not normally meet at busy holiday seasons (e.g. Near Christmas Tide). On the other hand, once or twice a year (e.g. during Lent) we have a short

weekly special-study course.

But for the rest of the year we meet generally once a fortnight, at 8.15 p, in the Rectory. For up to 40 minutes there would be Bible Study: then following that a short time of prayer for parish needs, for those who are sick or in special trouble, and for the wider needs of our country and the world at large. Then finally, there is coffee at not later than 9.15 pm.

For the Bible Study we have been moving through John's Gospel, thinking about it more thoroughly than would be possible at a Sunday service. The Rector usually leads the study, but would not do all the talking; and the comments others make, and the questions we ask, and the conversation that ensues,

are full of interest and practical help.

At the same time, though all are welcome to chime in, no one is required to, and some are content to listen. The same is true of the short prayer time too, of course. This means that no special demands are made on anyone who comes. It would be easy for a new arrival, or someone who does not feel able to contribute, to feel at ease and to enjoy it straight away.

Come when you can, even if you cannot come regularly. The dates in January are 4th and 18th.

PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

January 1978

PARISH RATE

Financial matters were considered at the January meeting of the Parish Council. We are to keep the Parish Rate as it was last year. This produces some £750 and that sum is sufficient at the moment to finance matters dealt with by the Council. Help has been given during the year towards upkeep of the village hall, the churchyard, and grass-cutting on the cricket green and football pitch.

HAMBLEDON HOMES

Over the past few months interest has again centred around the future of the now empty Hambledon Homes. The County Council has allowed a number of interested parties to look over the buildings and grounds and it is likely that some proposition will soon be put forward. The Parish Council's proposals outlined at the last Parish Assembly have been adopted in part by Waverley District Council and put up to S. C. C.; it is progressing but slowly.

PARISH BOUNDARIES

The Local Government Boundary Commission will soon be reviewing Parish Boundaries, which have not been changed for about 100 years. Hambledon Parish Council is well aware that we have in the Wormley Hill area and especially the Hydestile region many residents who like to consider themselves part of Hambledon - our Jubilee celebration bore this out. It is extremely difficult to make suggestions regarding these areas without causing possible offence to neighbouring parish councils but each council has been asked to submit recommendations. Anyone reading these Notes and living in the areas mentioned is welcome to contact the Chairman, Mr. M. F. Coleman, on Wormley 2977, if they have a point to make.

ANNUAL PARISH ASSEMBLY

The Annual Parish Assembly will take place on <u>28th April</u>. We plan to follow the same format as last year with representatives of the local organisations giving brief resumes of their activities. We should also like to give parishioners a chance to see photographs and other visual records of the Jubilee Year. The Chairman would like to borrow items for a display at the Assembly with the promise that he would collect them, and return them after the 28th.

VILLAGE HALL COMMITTEE

The Annual General Meeting of the Village Hall Committee will be held on 14th February in the Village Hall at 8 p.m.

CRICKET CLUB
