WEDNESDAY EVENING BIBLE-STUDIES

Now that we have completed our study of John's Gospel, we move on to its sequel, the early story of the Christian Church in the New Testament, in the book of Acts.

These fortnightly studies do not presuppose a great deal of existing knowledge. The Rector leads them, but there is also opportunity for questions and for others to contribute to some discussion a rising. But nobody is "required to take part", and it is easy for any who wish simply to listen.

We begin on Wednesday 17 January at 8.15 pm in the Rectory. There is coffee at the close, at 9.15 pm. All are most welcome even if they are not necessarily able to come regularly.

CONFIRMATION PREPARATION & A SPECIAL ADULTS COURSE

Following the preliminary paragraph in the December magazine, here are some further notes:-The course is exploratory only. Nobody would be committed to Confirmation until much later on. * There would be one course for Young People (minimum age about 15), probably on a week night evening; some are already enquiring about this. A separate course for adults could be arranged, morning, afternoon, or evening as convehient. * Both courses would cover the main ground of Christian belief - in God, in Jesus as Son of God, in the Holy Spirit, in the way we can come to know God, and find forgiveness and inner deliverance. It also tackles some of the problems of unbelief. There is also help on prayer, Bible reading, and daily living; and teaching about the Church and its sacraments and services. Juestions and problems are welcomed for informal discussion. * Such a course has often been valued by those previously confirmed as a "refresher course", and the Rector would welcome this. * Names of those interested shoull come to the Rectory soon please.

Open Meeting

The Parish Council realises that many people in Hambledon are vitally interested in the running of their village and will be pleased to note that it is intended to hold an informal seminar on the broader aspects of planning. It will be held on Friday, 23rd February, in the Village Hall, Hambledon. The County Planning Officer, Mr. Peter Harris, has accepted our invitation, which has also been sent to the District Planning Officer, Mr. J. H. Wainwright, our W. D. C. representative, Maj. E. Mervyn-Smith, our S. C. C. representative, Dr. J. Wood, and elected representatives of adjoining parishes. The idea of the seminar is for parishioners to meet the officers and discuss themes regarding the future development of villages in this district. It is hoped that each will learn from the other. The seminar will start at 7.30 and anyone interested is welcome to attend and participate.

Elections

Waverley District Council and Parish Council elections will be held in early May. Maj. E. Mervyn-Smith has indicated that he does not wish to be considered for re-election, and thus it will be necessary for us to find a new councillor. If you know of somebody who might be interested, please ask them to phone Maj. Mervyn-Smith, Hascombe 219, who will give them some idea of the duties and time involved.

Anyone interested in the possibility of becoming a Parish Councillor should contact the Clerk, on Wormley 3532.

Parish Councillors elected this year may stand for 4 years. The Waverley councillor will' also stand for 4 years, and represent Hambledon only - by 1983 the warding system may well be changed and the councillor will then represent Hambledon, Busbridge and Hascombe.

Parish Boundaries

W. D. C. are still inviting people to send in comments regarding the redrawing of parish boundaries. Your council put in their proposals several months ago - the main change being that we recommend that housing north of Salt Lane come within Hambledon parish boundary (this with the full agreement of Busbridge Parish Council).

The Parish Council voted at their last meeting not to enter the village in the Surrey Best Kept Village Competition. It is, however, open to any organisation or group of people within the village to sponsor an entry and if they wish to do so, the relevant forms are lodged with the Clerk.
