THE RECTOR WRITES

MayI give you a verse for the New Year?

I THE LORD YOUR GOD WILL HOLD YOUR RIGHT HAND, SAYING "FEAR NOT, I WILL HELP YOU". (Isaiah 41,13)

There are many things we could fear as we go on into 1980. We may have some anxiety about our physical fitness, or about someone we love. We may be concerned about financial affairs, or about whether we can measure up to the demands of the year. We may be worried about the world situation.

Here is a PROMISE a promise from GOD. So we can depend upon it. It is in a way a double promise:— (i) It promises God's presence and His nearness, at every moment and always. "I will hold your hand". For when we commit our lives to Him, and when He takes us to Himself, it is for ever. He does not let us go. (ii) It promises also God's help. Nothing could be more encouraging and satisfying than those simple words "I will help you".

The right hand is the hand a soldier usually keeps for his sword. Give that one to God. You will be safer that way.

May God be your guide, and your guardian, and your help all through the year.
