





Dear Friends

When my older brother and I were quite little, my grandparents went on holiday somewhere in Africa. I can remember going to meet them at the airport, and naturally the most exciting bit was seeing what presents they had brought back for us. They handed my brother Paul a little carved wooden figure, carrying a spear and a large shield.

"He's a warrior," said my Grandfather. Paul looked puzzled.

"What does he worry about?" he asked.

I wonder if you are a worrier, as we start this new year? Jesus gave some clear advice on the subject: "Do no worry about your life, what you will eat or drink, or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more important than food, and the body more important then clothes? Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they? Who of you by worrying can add a single hour to his life?"

Jesus calls his followers to total, wholehearted commitment – to make God their top priority. He goes on to say, "Seek first God's kingdom, and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well." What does that mean? Well, God's Kingdom simply means God's rule, God being in charge in our hearts and lives. Righteousness is an idea that gets a lot of bad press - we tend to think of people who are self-righteous or judgmental. But to be righteous just means to be right with God - to be in a right relationship with him. So 'Kingdom' and 'Righteousness' go together if God rules our hearts and we obey him, then we'll be righteous - right with God.

That is what Jesus tells us to 'seek' - not in the sense of looking for something that's lost, but by putting it in the centre of our lives – Jesus calls us to an ongoing, constant duty to make being right with God the very heart of who we are. So Jesus is talking about our priorities. If we're always worrying about practical needs then we're not putting God first - it gets in the way between us and God. When Jesus called his first disciples to follow him, they didn't say - "Hang on a minute, where will we have tea tonight?" They just got up and followed. If they had stopped to worry about how they would live, they wouldn't have done it - we know that because we see others in the Gospel stories who promise to follow Jesus once they've sorted out their practical needs, and we never hear of them again.

If we make following God our first priority, God can take care of the rest, and we don't have to worry. This doesn't mean that we don't have to work - God is not in the business of feeding and clothing us just because we can't be bothered to do it for ourselves. But we don't have to worry because as Jesus points out, worrying is pointless anyway... "Who of you by worrying can add a single hour to his life?" Worrying achieves nothing so why do we let it fill our heads?

When I was at college just before I got ordained, I met a lovely retired Bishop who asked how I felt about ordination. I told him I was terrified. He said he'd been terrified when they made him a Bishop, but someone gave him a prayer to say – "Lord, I can't, but you can."

It's a prayer I use all the time! The more I understand that God is in charge, the more I try to do things his way, the more I realise that he can - he can do it, he can take care of all the details. And





Following protracted negotiations with Surrey's Rights of Way Officer and a commitment by Hambledon Parish Council to foot the bill, the path running down from Beech Hill to Vann Lane has at last been repaired - on the day immediately preceding the heaviest weekend rainfall of the year!. However, the new surface has stood up well and the path is once again useable by those who like to walk down to the Village Shop.

It was good to have a written report from our new neighbourhood specialist Police officer, Sam Barnett, at the last Parish Council meeting. Sam and her husband are both full-time policemen so juggling shifts and children makes it difficult for Sam to attend meetings. However, she is hoping to come along in January and she already has the date of the next Parish Assembly in her diary.

The first progress report has been received from the Project Manager for the Hambledon and Wormley mains drainage scheme. Work has been slowed down by the recent heavy rain but the team are hoping to get off to a good start in the new year. The ground is already being prepared for laying pipes across the land at Ram Alley Cluns and Tigbourne Farms; and the contractor's tree specialists have undertaken extensive surveys to ensure the protection of trees in the vicinity of the works. A newsletter is due to be sent out by Southern Water to affected residents before the end of the year and further issues are planned on a quarterly basis.



"Night Before Christmas" Cake

Ingredients

½ cup of sugar 2 cup of butter 2 beaten eggs

2 veater eggs
½ cup of warm milk

package of yeast dissolved in 45ml warm water

3 cups of flour

ltsp salt ½tsp vanilla

Directions:

Cream together sugar and butter. Then add eggs, milk, 1 package of yeast dissolved in 15 ml of warm water, flour, salt and vanilla. Beat all of these ingredients together. Then set dough aside and let it rise, until double in size. When your cake dough has risen to double the size (this may take about 2 hours) put it in a greased pan and spread with topping; Combine sugar, cinnamon, melted butter and nuts. Now place: in a cold oven and leave it in there overnight to rise. The next morning turn oven to 175 degrees celsius and bake for 1/2 hour. Take out and serve warm. This makes a large cake or you can put the dough in two round pans instead.






The German Air Crash at Lodge Bottom (Part 1)

How many times have you driven through Lodge Bottom on the Hambledon Road and glanced over to the statue standing at the far side of the dewpond? One or two may know some of the history behind it but the whole story is full of fascination. Over the next few editions, with the help of a wealth of material provided by Lady Gillian Brunton who lives at North Munstead Farm and articles written by Frances Morris, I will attempt to bring to life the characters who took part in the events of 9 April 1941.

There was a survivor, a young girl involved in the rescue of the survivor, and the air crew who shot the plane down and all have a story to tell. Our story must start however with Gillian Brunton because little would have been known about the crash if she had not researched it in the first place.

Her story started when the Brunton family moved into North Munstead Farm in 1970.



She tells us, "Soon after moving to the farm, an old gardener who had worked there since he was a boy, told us about 'The German bomber that crashed in the pond field'. He led us through the garden and down a steep slope until we reached the dewpond at Lodge Bottom. On the way he described how the disabled plane had crashed through the treetops and swerved into the valley before coming to land on the bank at the edge of the pond."

He went on to tell her that all the crew were killed, except for one survivor who was taken in an ambulance to the local hospital. He had never heard if he lived or died, but did say, "they buried the others in Milford graveyard but dug them up after the war and moved them to a cemetery up north somewhere ... it all caused quite a stir at the time ... but life had to go on, war or no war, and the whole thing was soon forgotten ... "

She relates how she remembered his words and the sadness that that was felt as they stood there on that lovely peaceful spot in the pale autumn sunshine.

As the years passed, she would always stop by the pond to think about the young airmen and of their families who must still be grieving for them and wondering exactly where or how they had died. There was nothing to mark this place where their lives had ended so abruptly, and it worried her that there might come a time when their story would be forgotten or fade into some half remembered myth. So she decided that before they left the farm, some permanent reminder must be erected on the spot to record the details of the bomber and of her crew. It was then that she realized just how little she knew about the plane, the crew or the circumstances surrounding the crash. Before she could begin she would need to build up a detailed picture of all these factors.



After many years of nagging, Maureen eventually persuaded Barry to go on a cruise. On the first night the purser knocked on their Cabin door and said the captain requested their company at his dinner table. A visit to Milford churchyard proved fruitless, as neither the young minister nor the verger had heard of the airmen, nor could they find any record of their exhumation and their reburial.

In January 1989 a man called John Castle telephoned Gillian to ask if he could come with a young friend, Stuart Mina, to use their metal detectors on their land. Stuart had mentioned to him that a plane had been brought down in a particular field where they hoped to find the site of the crash.

It soon became clear that if anyone could shed light on the German bomber it would be John, for he had a brilliant and enquiring mind with a prodigious memory that stored a mine of information. His enthusiasm was matched only by his great stamina and dogged determination.

On the west bank of the pond John and Stuart found twisted bits of alloy and corroded bullets, which were standard German machine gun ammo (7.92mm). The fact that these had not been blown open indicated that the plane had not caught fire.

Filled with enthusiasm, John returned with a new and more powerful metal detecting gun to resume his search.

Some weeks later he appeared at the door flushed and shaking with excitement. He held in his hand a small grimy piece of metal. Beaming, he said "This is it ... the fingerprint ... the aircraft plate!" On it was written:-

NDW. HellIP B Nr. 407 W Nr. 1423 Z Nr. 111.60001 01-IAbnahame 18.11.38

John had found the key that would open the door to all the technical information that he was looking for. He gave Gillian the address of Colin Pratley at Croydon Aviation Archaeological Society and suggested that he might have some information on the bomber and her crew.

Next edition -Official details of the crash and names of the British aircrew and German crew discovered.

Christian Basics: God the Creator?

In today's culture the story of our universe's origin focuses on the big bang. A lump of matter, smaller than a pinhead, exploded 15 billion years ago, producing billions of stars. Life took shape as the necessary elements came together from the dust of exploding stars. And so the story goes on! It defines who we are and where we come from.

However, whether we accept the science or not, this is only half the story! The Bible sets out another story, in which God is creator of the universe, 'By faith we understand that the universe was formed at God's command, so that what is seen was not made out of what was visible' (Hebrews 11:3).

So how is God as Creator presented in Genesis 1?

'In the beginning God': While science can offer answers about the how of creation, the Bible tells us about the WHY- i.e. the purpose of the Creator. Creation reflects the character and glory of God, inviting a response of dependence and praise!

'God created the heavens and the earth': God shapes the universe, as expressed in the six days of creation. They speak of an ordered and purposeful universe that expresses his will; God spoke and it was done! An alternative translation says 'God began creating...' This reminds us that creation is not simply a past event, but an incomplete process. The Holy Spirit who brought life out of chaos at the beginning is still working in our lives and world.

'God created man in his own image': We mustn't miss the point of the narrative; human beings are the climax and crown of creation. We share the sixth day of creation with other creatures, as well as 95% of the same DNA. However, we are distinctively made in the image of God, which means that we are not simply here for ourselves, but we are created for relationship with God. This involves reflecting and representing God's character in our relationship with and responsibility for the created order.

'And God saw that it was good': Like an artist, God described his work as good. We should never lose the sense of wonder, blessing and enjoyment in God's world, which includes affirming creativity not only in ourselves but others.

However, our experience tells us that the image of God in us is marred; how this happened we will consider next time!

An Occasional Column From Around Our Plot

Have you noticed that fewer and fewer people are using their indicators over the past few years? Bearing in mind that we all thought that BMW drivers, white van man and ladies on the school run were exempt from all legal requirements!

So I phoned the police at what I thought was Farnham police station, but turned out to be at Chertsey, and talked to a charming lady (who preferred not to be named). She told me that it is not a requirement of law, but if an accident occurs by failing to indicate, you can be prosecuted for driving without due care and attention. Clear? I thought not!

Keeping to the vehicle theme this must be a contender in the ongoing "largest vehicle in our lanes" competition. I was told that a car transporter, with Italian plates, was spotted on the 'single lane with passing places' section of Markwick Lane a few weeks ago. Thank you sat-navs!

As we all know the January 2008 edition of the Parish Magazine usually arrives before Christmas, so if you fancy a walk to shake of the seasonal excesses, and the countryside is soaking, this walk is usually a bit dryer.

A Stroll Through Godalming and Pepperharrow (just under 6 miles)

After starting off from Godalming station, bear left down the station approach, soon to take a signposted pedestrian path on the left. Turning left down the road alongside the church, shortly take a signposted footpath on the left across the river and through a car park to rejoin the road before going under the railway. Turn left on the signposted path to continue along the riverside. After about 400 yards fork right again, passing a pillar box, to go alongside a garden and house to a road which bears to the left and enters woodland.

After about half a mile, join a tarmac track and soon turn left on a signposted bridleway which later joins a concrete drive. After some three quarters of a mile the bridleway reaches the road, where it turns right. Shortly turning right again, join a path to cross the footbridge over the A3 and soon go through a gate. Turning right, it follows a path round a field, going through a horse gate in the corner. Turn immediately left and cross a strip of woodland and, maintaining direction, follow the path to a church and the village of Pepperharrow. The church has a Norman doorway and a Norman chancel arch but is only open for services.

After visiting the church, continue through the tiny village and along the drive to the road where it turns right and immediately left. After about 200 yards, turn right through Shackleford Heath on the main path until a road is reached which needs to be crossed. Maintaining direction, reach the horse gate which was negotiated earlier and follow the path round to the left, finally to reach the footbridge over the A3. Retrace your steps but pass the turning that you came from earlier and continue forward to the Eashing Bridge.

Immediately over the bridge, turn left on a sign posted footpath alongside the river, later with a field on the left and after a stile, cross a field finally to reach the road, where you turn left. After a sharp right hand bend in the road, turn left along a wide surfaced track and, after passing Halfway House, continue on the track round a sharp right bend, soon to take a path alongside a house. Continue down this path and join a metalled road that passes the entrance to the platform at Godalming station.







About sixty formations were recorded, mostly in the prehistoric sanctuary area around Avebury in Wiltshire. Most of them were geometric, beautifully conceived and executed, often witty and puzzling. A rare semi-figurative design showed the entrance to a mystic or Masonic temple and the seven stages of initiation. The largest and most talked-about formation was an eastern 'Om' symbol over a thousand feet in length. It appeared below a hill in the East Field, near Alton Barnes in Wiltshire, where researchers with video cameras were on the lookout. At 1.35 am their film showed an unmarked wheat field, then at 3 am there was a flash of light, and twenty minutes later the formation was visible.


It is the same every year. Impossible things seem to happen, but the evidence points in different directions



EARTHWORM

Another year has spun by and as the New Year approaches and we go to press (early to please Ed) Earthworm looks out from his heap shivering with cold but marveling at the beauty of yet another morning of white frost. More like winter he thinks, approvingly.



Somehow the mild weeks, pleasant though they have been, make Earthworm feel as if he is being cheated of winter. We need the cold snaps he declares, not only to rid the garden of bugs and diseases, but there are seeds that will not germinate in spring unless they have been subjected to a period of cold.

There has been a lot of rain too. All those with storage tanks must now have them filled to the brim. They will serve them well if there is another dry spring or summer. Earthworm wonders too if readers have noticed the lovely light we have been enjoying, especially in the early afternoons. Could this be in part an effect of global warming? Sunrises and sunsets have been spectacular. Could the atmosphere be changing?

Earthworm sees a lot of winter beauty all around. There is a beauty in bare trees, the shapes and twists of their branches, and with some ornamental trees, fantastic colours especially against the light; branches of orange and reds, and the greens and browns of the catkins already forming on the road-side hazels. The dried spikes of shrubs and grasses that have still to be cut down before the new growth appears are hugely enhanced by a sprinkling of frost.

Always pre-occupied with the weather Earthworm will be following the advice of "Weather Eye" in the Times who tells us that for the later part of December we should enjoy "halcyon days" These begin at this time when there is period of settled weather "bringing clear skies and quiet weather, also frost and cold." As we go to press he is dead right, though Earthworm does wonder what "quiet" weather is. He had noticed when wriggling through the garden that all is very quiet in his garden and had indeed remarked on it to one of his friends. He will certainly seek to take advantage of these halcyon days and get things done out of doors. It is certainly better than the lashing rain and gales we had earlier.

For those readers who like Earthworm did not enjoy a "classical education "Weather Eye has also explained the origins of halcyon days in this legend: "Alcyone was the daughter of the ruler of the winds, Aeolus, and married King Ceyx whose ship sunk in a storm. Filled with grief she threw herself in to the sea but was carried up on a wind and she and Ceyx were changed in to birds. She laid her eggs in a nest floating by the sea during the winter solstice when her father would bring calm to the seas and keep away storms. It is a charming and romantic story beloved by sentimentalists like Earthworm. However it must be no coincidence that the kingfisher may have inspired the name as he is scientifically known as Halcyon.



Delicious Ham and Potato Soup

"This is a delicious recipe for ham and potato soup that a friend gave to me. It is very easy and the great thing about it is that you can add additional ingredients, more ham, potatoes, etc and it still turns out great."

Ingredients

3 ½ cups	peeled and diced potatoes
¹/₃ cup	diced celery
¹/₃ cup	finely chopped onion
<i>¾ cup</i>	diced cooked ham
3¼ cups	water
2 tbs	chicken bouillon granules
½ tsp	salt, or to taste
1 tsp	ground white or black pepper, or to taste
5 tbs	butter
5 tbs	all-purpose flour
2 cups	milk

Combine the potatoes, celery, onion, ham and water in a stockpot. Bring to a boil, then cook over medium heat until potatoes are tender, about 10 to 15 minutes. Stir in the chicken bouillon, salt and pepper.

In a separate saucepan, melt butter over medium-low heat. Whisk in flour with a fork, and cook, stirring constantly until thick, about 1 minute. Slowly stir in milk as not to allow lumps to form until all of the milk has been added. Continue stirring over medium-low heat until thick, 4 to 5 minutes.

Stir the milk mixture into the stockpot, and cook soup until heated through. Serve immediately.



St WULFSTAN 19th January

St Wulfstan was Bishop of Worcester from 1062-95. He lived during the Norman Conquest of England and was the only Saxon bishop to remain under William the Conqueror.

Wulfstan was a caring and hardworking monk. He rebuilt the cathedral at Worcester, cared for the poor, and struggled to ease the harsh conditions imposed by the Normans on the Saxons. Unlike some priests, he baptised children of the poor without charge. It is said that he never turned away people asking for help.

Wulfstan fought the slave trade in Bristol (slave trading didn't just start with slaves from Africa but had been going on for centuries with slaves from England being sold to Ireland and North Africa).

Wulfstan died whilst washing the feet of 12 poor men during a service in the cathedral. He died as he had lived, serving God and caring for others.


