This year's Guildford Lecturers will be speaking about everybody's concern, death - and life after death. The first is certain. Is the second wishful thinking?

Dr. Leggett will assess the evidence for the age-old belief in life after death. He is a mathematician and therefore trained to think clearly and consistently. He is Vice-Chancellor of Surrey University and therefore accustomed to look at things from the objective standpoint of the professional scientist. Even the most sceptical must admit that his considered judgment will be worth hearing.

Facts need explanation in the light of other knowledge. Dr. Carpenter is a historian and philosopher. He knows how to look at facts against a wide background. He is also an experienced author, lecturer and broadcaster, who knows how to get across a difficult subject.

How does Christianity fit into all this with its Gospel narratives of the resurrection of Jesus, and St. Paul's assertion that a Christian has entered into a new kind of life. What can we make of this and does it appear to have any confirmation in history? The Dean of Exeter has made a special study of this area of thought and experience and has written a book entitled "Spiritualism, Reincarnation and Immortality".
