#### FELLOWSHIP OUTING TO MICHELHAM PRIORY

This year we went to Michelham Priory on Saturday, 9th May. It is delightfully situate some ten miles from Eastbourne, and we called at Cowfold en route for coffee and hot scones and to see the marvellous brass to Prior Neland, dating from 1433, some ten feet in length, in the Parish Church adjoining.

Thence to Lewes, a traffic-ridden town, for refreshments, arriving at the Priory at two o'clock. The flowering trees on the way were at their peak of perfection, and the pastoral scene was enhanced by so many new-born lambs.

We found the time allowed at Michelham barely sufficient to look over the house, inspect the extensive grounds and garden and finally to enjoy a Sussex cream tea. We had allowed three hours and it was fully needed.

On our return we called at Rusper where a shortened service of Evensong was, in the unavoidable absence of the Vicar, taken by the Lay Reader, who, with the Organist, made us welcome.

Before the coach left Rusper for the last lap of the return journey, Mrs. Ellingson proposed a vote of thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Adgie, who had organised the outing, for all the time and effort they had given to the preparations. It was a most successful day.
