This commenced on Whitsunday with a day of prayer throughout the diocese. Churches of all denominations are uniting in this effort for a revival among Christians and to making Christ known to others.

It has been suggested that a new call to mission should be commenced at Whitsun 1973 with a year of preparation. # EXTRACTS FROM THE VILLAGE SCRAP BOOK (Cont.)

#### The Fields.

The village of Hambledon, like many other villages, probably grew round a farmstead (where there was a spring or good water supply), which gathered more dwellings around itself, the inhabitants farming the "open fields" as a community, and pasturing their pigs and other animals on "the common".

Fields and their shape record ancient and less ancient history, and a map marking field boundaries will reveal very different patterns, including quite a few of the old open fields, each of hundreds There is a field which is still called "Hundred Acre" on the south side of Vann Lane. Originally the open fields were worked in a communal fashion, but sometimes whole furlongs would be enclosed between hedges, producing smaller fields which were allotted to different farms. But the wholesale break-up of the great fields quickened in the last decades of the 18th century, in a zeal for more profitable and less piecemeal cultivation Enclosure was achieved at first by of the land. a private Act of Parliament, then by local consent without an Act, and last of all by commissioners The result was a revowho made enclosure awards. lution in the way of life and in landscape. times the farmers divided their fields by banks as well as by hedges, and these still survive round many Hambledon fields. But with modern methods of farming entailing the use of less men and more nachinery, banks and hedges are disappearing again, and farmland is reverting to the open fields of our ancestors. Many fields had paths running along one or two sides, and this fact may account for the sharp bends in some of the country lanes, which have grown out of the field paths.
