Edward Shirras, and his wife and children will be with us for tea. We expect also to have at home all three daughters, Clare, Judith and Jill, together with Clare's husband John and baby Joanna. We thought that on this day when, unusually, we are all together, it would be nice if our congregation could come too, with longer time to meet them than they have had hitherto. All are not welcome. Come if you can. Incidentally, if some of our members have not been to the Rectory since we arrived, it is high time that was put right!

As you will see from the Diary, Mr. Shirras comes to us on 6 July to preach on behalf of the Church Pastoral-Aid Society. Here in Hambledon we have a special place in our hearts for this great society, for they are Patrons of this living, and indeed it was Mr. Shirras himself who came here a year ago just after Mr. Elton left, to meet the Wardens and Church Council and confer with them about a successor. Now he comes to tell us in his sermons something of the work of CPAS, which for more than a century has been in effect the missionary society of the Church of England to large numbers in our own country (especially in the great cities) who are far out of touch with any church, and never hear its message. Through the Christian camps it provides for urban children, through the

literature it puts in our hands, through the grants it gives to enable many a parish to have a curate, it has had a great share in the work of the Mission Field of England. It will be good to hear more about it, and to give too.

NEWS FROM THE PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL

At the first meeting of the new Council on 13 June several matters were discussed which can be publicized usefully here:-

CHURCHYARD A number of members of the congregation responded to our appeal for help in taming the grass especially near the tombstones. We thank them all sincerely, and especially those who have been to work there several times. We want quickly to complete cutting down such long grass as remains to the point when machines can take over. Then the whole of our attractive churchyard can be kept neat and tidy all through the year.

CAR PARKING AT COURT FARM Those who bring cars to our church services will remember that there was one Sunday recently when the courtyard was out of action because it was being resurfaced. This is a reminder to us that cur considerable usage of the courtyard must have contributed a good deal to its need for restoration.

Now that the surface has been renewed let us do our part to DRIVE ONLY VERY SLOWLY when entering and leaving, both to take care of the gates, and also to avoid throwing gravel on to the grass verges. We are most grateful to Major and Mrs. Major for their kindness.

EASTER OFFERING At the Church Annual Meeting some members had expressed disappointment at the fact that the Easter Offering is now added to an incumbent's income when the Diocese calculates what subsidy is needed to bring his stipend up to the Diocesan scale. After a thorough discussion by the Council, the following points emerged:

- (i) Though most unfortunately it was not realised by our church members, this scheme was approved by the clergy of the Diocese in 1969 as being the fairest available, and has been operating ever since.
- (ii) In recent years the Diocesan authorities have faced the task of ensuring that clergy stipends did not lag too far behind inflation, and also of reducing the unreasonable anomalies between parishes. (Easter Offerings, for instance, might vary between one parish and another by over £200, and not necessarily according to the merit of the person concerned!) In doing this, the Diocese had inevitably to call for a sharply increased quota from the parishes, and in order not to make their demands even greater they felt it right to add together all an incumbent's income (including Easter Offering), and then add their subsidy to bring the total up to the Diocesan scale. Here in Hambledon the subsidy from the Diocese amounts to more than half the stipend, so we have every reason to be grateful to them.

(iii) The scheme adopted in 1969 is nationwide. All the Dioceses work this way, and the Church Commissioners also give some central funds to the Diocese on this basis. So even if we wished to do so we could not change it.

ORGAN The updated quotation for organ renovation was, as we feared, considerably increased. There is, however, the possibility that the Council can find a cheaper way of gaining the desired end, and this is being explored immediately.

WELL DONE

At the Village Annual Meeting in May there was news of the fine performance of a young Hambledon motor cyclist, John May. A fortnight earlier he had been the only one of 15 British riders to complete a gruelling West German round of the European two day championship. Atrocious conditions with mud, snow, and cold faced 129 riders from many nations.

Subsequently the British team did much better in Czechoslovakia, when four of them, again including John May, took gold medals. This was a test of courage and character as well as skill.

P.S. The Rector hopes that always someone will be kind enough to let him know similar good news of our parishioners. It will be a pleasure to publish it in this magazine.
