### WHERE DOES ALL THE MONEY GO? (continued)

As requested at the Annual Meeting we are giving some brief notes about the societies to which as a Church we gave gifts last year. Last month we mentioned the causes to which we gave £50 or more, though we somehow omitted the BIBLE CHURCHMEN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY (the parent society within which the Ruanda Mission is a special interest of ours): THE CHURCH'S MINISTRY AMONG JEWS: AFRICA INLAND MISSION: and GIDEONS INTERNATIONAL (which provides Bibles in hotels, prisons, hospitals etc.). Educational Societies:- CHURCH SOCIETY (Anglican) and THE EVANGELICAL ALLIANŒ (Interdenominational) are

two societies which seek to promote a biblical and evangelical viewpoint in the Home Churches: and KESWICK CONVENTION is a great annual Christian week in the Lake District where our gifts might help a missionary on furlough to attend. Caring Societies: - THE SAMARITANS (Guildford area) and the WEST SURREY CHESHIRE HOME speak for themselves as far as we are concerned. THE SHAFTESBURY SOCIETY cares for boys, and DR BARNARDO'S cares for girls as well. THE MISSION OF HOPE is a Christian home for unmarried mothers and their babies. THE RICHMOND FELLOWSHIP is for mental welfare and rehabilitation. We also send small subscriptions to associate ourselves with GUILDFORD WATHEDRAL: THE HISTORIC CHURCHES PRESERVATION TRUST and INCORPORATED CHURCH BUIDDING SOCIETY: THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND PENSIONS BOARD (to help forward the provision of retirement accommodation for clergy): ST LUKE'S (a small London hospital providing good treatment for clergy): ST. JOHN'S, NOTTINCHAM (one of the evangelical theological colleges): THE MINISTRY OF CHRISTIAN INFORMATION, which provides written answers to (sometimes anonymous) enquirers about the Christian Faith.
