I ask all our members to read the article on pages 4/5. It shows all of us who pay income tax at the standard rate how easy it is, without extra cost to ourselves, to increase the value of our gifts by 43%. without necessarily binding ourselves to the same causes every mear.

After reading the article, many members may feel that the best arrangement is for them to have two covenants, (they need only be for four years, not seven as formerly):
1) One covenant with our own church. For this we need only to ask Miss Denny (Wormley 2461), who will explain fully and make things easy for us. Don't forget that if you like you can still place the covenanted money in Scheme.

2) One covenant with the Charities and Foundation to cover all other causes (e.g. Missionary Societies, Relief work, energency appeals). It is much better for such gifts not to be channeled through the church; and the article explains how we can change our distribution from year to year. For this you should write for details from the C.A.F. at 48 Pembury Road, Tonbridge,

Allocating our gifts is one of the year's happiest jobs. Paul wrote, "God loves a cheerful(the Greek is 'hilaros') giver".

It is, perhaps, appropriate that the Rector should have asked me to write a note on the CAF because I was so very slow in appreciating the facilities which they offer, and regret that I did not start years earlier to channel the bulk of my missionary and charitable giving through them. I am glad to have the opportunity, therefore, of trying to encourage others, who may not be fully aware of the CAF, to enquire further how the Foundation

can help them.

I believe that most people have several charities which they like to support on a regular basis, and this means that, to maximise giving, individual covenants need to be made to take advantage of the income tax refund (for someone paying tax at the standard rate, this increases the net amount by nearly 43%). Ad hoc contributions to other charities or disaster appeals do not qualify for tax refund because they are not covenanted.

The CAF offers the advantages of simplicity and flexibility combined with full tax refund on the whole covenanted amount. All that is necessary is a single covenant with the CAF; then the amount prescribed plus the tax refund becomes available for distribution, both to registered charities and for any urpose recognised as charitable by the Inland levenue (e.g. most disaster appeals). Donations an be made by Charity Credits written out y the subscriber (rather like drawing a beque on a current account), or by the CAF hrough standing orders or other payment nstructions (anonymously, if it is wished). t is, of course, possible to vary the amount iven to individual charities from year to car, thus enabling a prompt and effective

response if one charity is in special need while another's requirements may be less immediate. Money available on a CAF covenant does not have to be distributed in the particular year, and some may be carried forward to the following year, thus giving further flexibility. And a covenant with CAF does not have to be additional to existing covenants, since charities usually are very ready to agree that outstanding payments may be made through CAF.

The CAF charges a small operating fee: 3% of the covenanted amount goes to its founder, now the National Council for Voluntary Organisations. The minimum period for a covenant has been reduced from seven to four years. The initial deed can be for a minimum amount, and additional or substitute deeds completed later if desired, so one need not feel circumscribed. Deeds can be tailormade to suit individual circumstances.

Of course, St. Teter's supports a range of home and overseas missions and other charities - something like a quarter of church income is distributed in this way. The disadvantage, however, of channeling ones main missionary and charitable giving through the church is that it is in a sense "taxed" by the Diocese because the Quota is assessed on total church income. This is not really a good substitute for direct giving and the personal involvement which results.
