HAMBLEDON VILLAGE HALL * NEWS!!

Work on the extensions to the Hall is now complete and a start has been made on the repairs and refurbishment. A new floor is being laid, panelling to the stage area and a folding partition are soon to be completed. Electrical wiring, toilet improvements and a more useful kitchen are nearly complete.

The £11.000 that the Village Hall Committee had to raise is not yet complete and means that a loan of £4.000 has been taken out to enable us to actually spend the money in this financial year (unused parts of grants cannot be carried over into the next year).

Fund-raising is, therefore, still of paramount importance - there will be a Tramps' Supper in August, a Race Evening, in conjunction with the Cricket Club, on Friday 29th September, and a two-day Christmas Sale will take place on 25/26 November.

We know you have helped before, either directly or indirectly through the 'rates' but we still need more donations, either as gifts or deeds of covenant. You might like to contribute to a specific item; for instance the new outside lantern (£200), or either of the side lanterns (£80), a clock (£40), curtains (about £120 per window) or other items you know we still need.

When the interior work has been completed by the contractors, a considerable amount of painting will need to be undertaken and any volunteers, for a few hours, will be welcomed.

On Saturday 12th August everything should be finished and an Open Day will take place, with the Hall on show most of the day. An Opening Ceremony, with guests, will take

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place in the early evening and the 'ribbon' will be cut by / our youngest Committee member, Karen Vickery, who will represent the people likely to make the most use of the Hall


