Abel, a former Missionary in Papua, gave an address.

On Thursday, June 24th., the Women's Fellowship will meet at Ellingsons at 3.0 p.m., for a Garden Meeting. (If wet - in the house). The speaker will be Miss Louise Ryder of the Church Missionary Society in the Sudan. Members of Godalming Baptist Church and also Alfold Parish Church women's organisations will be joining us for this meeting.

The Church Missionary Society has given us the following information about our special speaker:-

"Miss Louise Ryder was for some years on the C. M. S., Headquarters staff. In the summer of 1956 an emergency arose in the C. M. S. Office in Juba in the Southern Sudan, and Miss Ryder was asked to go and help for a few months. After a few months she felt that the Sudan was the place to which God had called her and she asked to be released from the Headquarters staff. From 1958 onwards Miss Ryder was assistant to the mission secretary......This was a varied and interesting work, bringing her into contact with Sudanese Government officials as well as the people of the many tribes in the Southern Provinces. She also had the opportunity of teaching Scripture in the schools in Juba and thus came into touch with many of the students. Later Miss Ryder was re-located to the Northern Sudan as Secretary to the Bishop, the Rt. Rev. Oliver Allison at Omdurman. In this situation and new environment she found her work growing ever more interesting, getting to know pastors and gaining a picture of the Church in the Sudan as a whole,"
