CONFIRMATION

Eleven young people of our congregation are to be presented for Confirmation at Elstead Parish Church on Sunday, June 8th, at 3.0 p.m. The Bishop will be the Right Reverend St. J. S. Pike, D.D., Assistant Bishop of Guildford (formerly Bishop of Gambia and the Rio Pongas West Africa). All relatives and friends of the candidates who wish to attend the service are warmly invited, and the Rector of Elstead has said that there should be sufficient room for everyone - extra seating will be available. On account of the Confirmation Service on the Sunday afternoon, there will be a said Evening Prayer, without address, at Hambledon at 6.30 p.m.

The newly-confirmed will attend a FAMILY COMMUNION on Sunday, June 29th, at 11.0 a.m. This will be a special service to welcome the young people into the full fellowship of our Church at the Lord's Table, and we hope that there will be a good attendance at the service, which will take the place of Morning Prayer for this one Sunday only. For any who may not wish to remain for the Communion, there will be an opportunity to leave after the hymn following the sermon. The service will be the Prayer Book service and not the new "Series II" Holy Communion.

Dr. Hugh Sanson (Kenya). We were shocked to receive news of a vicious attack, by robbers, on Dr. Sanson at his office in Kenya and to learn that he was in hospital as a result of severe injuries inflicted on him. He remained in hospital for several weeks, and a letter dated May 13th has just been received (May 15th), indicating that he is now regaining his strength. Mrs. Sanson writes: "Hugh is making remarkably good progress and we hope to have him home during this week. All his wounds have healed very well, including the fracture of his skull. But we don't know as yet what will be the damage to his left hand and wrist in the end; this was very badly slashed and has many fractured bones and cut tendons. It was operated on immediately but it will be quite some time before we know what he can do with it..... In himself he is in fine fettle - he is longing to be home"

Dr. & Mrs. Sanson and family had, some time ago, made plans to spend their leave in England, and we are delighted to know that it will be possible for them to fulfil their intention to be here in June. We very much look forward to seeing them again, and trust that the holiday will help towards a complete recovery. Many in Africa and in this country have been remembering the Sanson family in their prayers recently, and we are thankful for answered prayer.

Sympathy. It was with regret that we learned of the sudden death of the father of Mr. Denys Head of Hydon Farm, and we assure him and his family of our sympathies in their bereavement. Mr. Head Senior was well known and respected in the area, and was a keen member of Shalford Parish Church. For many years he had been one of the Guildford Cathedral Guides and one seldom visited the Cathedral without finding him undertaking some duty there.

Distressed Gentlefolks Aid Association.

The Association depends entirely on voluntary subscriptions and legacies to help beneficiaries to lead a normal life in their own homes for as long as they are physically able to manage on their fixed and pathetically inadequate incomes, supplemented by financial aid and, where necessary, with clothing and food parcels.

The D.G.A.A. runs Residential and Nursing Homes, the Surrey one being Merlewood at Virginia Water, at which those who can no longer live alone are given security and companionship to the end of

their lives, and contribute only what they can afford.

A pledge has been given to beneficiaries at the cost - to Surrey - of about £11,000 each year with a further £49,500 for the Nursing Home. To keep faith, we need help very badly - will you give us this help?
