THE RECTOR WRITES . . .

We have all followed the recent news from Viet Nam and Cambodia with much concern.

I have just received a letter from a young missionary friend which gives further news which would not appear in the public media. With several other missionaries of the Overseas Missionary Fellowship and other societies, and two shortterm doctors, he was himself working in Phnom Penh, under occasional shell-fire, until February last when they were evacuated to Thailand (though since then a few of the men have returned). For Christians, the news of the Christian Church in Cambodia (or Khmer Republic as we must accustom ourselves to calling it), is both wonderfully encouraging, and also a great challenge to our prayers. There has been a remarkable growth of vigour in the Christian Church there recently. Whereas between 1923 and 1970 only 650 were baptised, since 1970 the number has been 1300. In 1970 the number of worshippers on Easter Sunday would be about 200, but this year it was over 3000 in 30 churches in some of which there was standing room only. A Khmer Christian, asked why his countrymen were turning to Christ, replied "(1) Because the people hear and see that Christians are concerned about the temporal needs of the people, and (2) Because the people have no hope. Their gods gave them doctrine but died and left them. However, 'Christ is alive' is often heard." evening Prayer Trung Poccie at the Rectory

As we thank God for this, we need urgently to pra for a young church now facing unknown dangers. In particular their leaders may soon be under threat. Pray that they may be given protection, grace and courage, at also for a fine group of Christian students who are like to be under new pressures now.

BRIEF POINTS FROM THE RECTOR'S ANNUAL REPORT (left over from last month)

- (1) Warm thanks not only to our elected officers, but to all who helped, in connection with our services, in the preservation cleaning and beautifying of the church, in production and distribution of the magazine, in our organisations (Women's Fellowship, Young People's Group, Parish Fellowship), or in any other way.
- (2) A tribute to the REv. Ted and Mrs. Elton for their gracious ministry over nearly 18 years
- (3) Numbers at services were steady. The total of communicants in 1974 had slightly increased. He was specially glad of those who worshipped every Sunday.
- (4) Evening services were neglected in many churches, and he hoped Hambledon would continue to point a better way. All were very happy to see the Young People coming in a group on the 2nd Sunday of the month.
- (5) Congregational singing was good. We owed much to Michael Puttock and were sorry to lose him; but were very glad Christopher Mabley was available and settling in to the task.
- (6) Can we act now to enlarge our choir? A few more at li am and several at 6.30 pm are needed. Even those who may not necessarily be able to come every Sunday could be a real help. Further enquiry straight away would be welcomed by the Rector, or the secret betrayal to him of the name of someone with an apt voice!
- (7) Congregational friendship was important, not just within like-minded groups, but right across the membership. The Lent mid-week evenings and occasional lunches had helped. We might try a summer Sunday lunch, and perhaps at the end of the year a short congregational weekend. (8) The Bishop of Guildford has provisionally booked June 12/13, 1976 for a visit to Hambledon and that would be a very special event.

(9) Confirmations: Perhaps we shall have a group ready to be confirmed then. Of course there would be a course of preparation beforehand, one for Young People (minimum age 15) and one for adults of all ages. The course would cover the main areas of Christian belief, practical help for living the Christian life, and teaching on the Church and sacraments. Candidates would want to find their way into worship and membership before being confirmed. Baptisms: Likewise in the case of baptisms, we encourage a parent to come into the worshipping family first and then they introduce their children in baptism

(10) Young People at their own request now held their informal "squashes" every Sunday at 7.45 p.m. and these were going happily and usefully.

(II) Children's Church was also going well. Nothing could be better than for a family to come together, and those who did so appreciated it greatly. But many local children did not come. If the Rector or Mrs, Thompson could be informed beforehand, we would gladly arrange for someone to sit with unattached boys and girls during a service.

(12) Missionary interest in the parish has been growing over the years. Living as we do in a specially protected and beautiful area we owe it to our fellows in other parts of the world to be aware of their needs and to act to help them. So missionary Sundays during the year are important days. May our parish giving increase steadily year by year.

(13) Prayer The members we need to thank more than any are those who pray, for we depend upon them more than we can say. Jesus said "Without Me you can do nothing."
