THE RECTOR WRITES.....

### WHAT PRICE WHITSUN?

Most of the great Christian Festivals ... Christmas, Good Friday, Easter... have to do with what God has done FOR us through His Son. Christians find much to rejoice about here, and make much of it.

Yet it can leave many, and perhaps some who read these lines, quite cold: they can't really see the point: they don't really feel the need: there is no real desire, no motivation, and no power to respond. We need to be spiritually "turned on". In other words, all that God (in Christ) did FOR us long ago may be wasted unless God does something IN us now.

Whitsun - the coming of the Holy Spirithas to do with God coming in, to do something in us. We call Him the Teacher because He helps us to see: we call Him the Giver of Life because He brings us to life: we call Him the Conforter (the old English word for strengthener) because He got us climbing, and tackling our problems victoriously.

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In all this HB is the one who takes the initiative and gets us going. Then, if that is so, where do we having

is so, where do we begin?

We can begin by ASKING. A one-hundredper-cant-honest prayer that He will open my eyes to see, that He will change me, that He will make me what He means me to be - this could open a door into a new life. It is a venture we ought not to miss.

# 4. RECTOR'S EVIEW (Further notes f in the Annual Meeting)

The Rector gave warm THANKS to a large number of members who helped in the practical, the administrative, and the pastoral work of the church, whether at church services, at informal meetings, or elsewhere. Many gave a {reat deal of time and trouble, and we all

appreciate this tremendously.

NUMBERS were fractionally smaller than last year. Six members had died and seventeen left the parish, and numbers on our Electoral Poll rad declined by 10 to 249. While numbers were not the only gauge (there was for example the good news of an increase in the number of those using daily Bible Reading notes), the slight fall should remind us of the need to come regularly. To be there is in itself a relp and encouragement to others. We do not come to church only for ourselves, but also for others, and most important of all for God.

SERVICES. Freference for the old or the new services is always a sensitive point. Some churches have even been split over it! The Rector felt that the proportion at present was about right for the Hambledon family. Most of our services (all at 8 am and all at 11 am) ere from the 1662 Prayer Book. A service from the Alternative Services Book is used monthly at the 9.45 am, and also monthly at the 6.30 pm Jormunion Service, and once a month at Evening rayer. This probably reflects preferences about fairly. Moreover the use of some services from the A.S.B. enables 1662-lovers to adjust and be ready for situations when, on holiday or after a move, they go to a church which uses only the new services. The Rector thanked members of the Hambledon family for their goodwill and understanding.

This is a family matter, where diversity of tastes ought to be expected, and accepted with love.

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LOOKING OUTWARD The weeks just prior to the Annual Meeting had been exceptional for the amount of sickness and sorrow in the village. Many of our friends and neighbours need our love and support. We need to remember, too, that Christians in Hambledon form only a minute part of the worldwide Family of God. Every day there are not just one or two, but many new Christians. Has Kingdom grows, and stands for ever". Let this inspire and encourage us to be faithful in our own task, and to pray expectantly.

#### TERSONALIA

MRS TOWNSEND continues to make slow but courageous and sustained progress in Unsted Fark where she works hard daily at speech and movement. MR DOUGLAS MACLACHIAN still has times of real disconfort but is unfailingly cheerful and gaining strength. We continue to remember also MR HARDING and MRS CULLIS who accept the ups and downs of their illness with great patience.

MR and MRS BLACKMAN and their family are safely back from the Argentine. We are sad that the unhappy events have brought them hurriedly back six months earlier than was planned, especially as Victoria, with three O levels already passed, was ready to tackle the rest this summer. For the present work and home and school are very uncertain. We give them our warm greetings.

Guildford Cathedral is facing grave financial difficulties, and an appeal for help has been made to all parishes in the Diocese. In response, a Garden Party is to be held in the Cathedral grounds on Saturday 17 July from 11 am to 5 pm.
