To the Chaplains, our Hon. Lay Reader and all those who have conducted the services in my absence, our grateful thanks.

May I draw your attention to the Diary in this magazine which gives details of the services during the remainder of Lent. There will be a "Mothering Service" on Mothering Sunday at 10.0 a.m., when we look forward to seeing children with their parents. Generous giving through Church Collections, Missionary Collecting Boxes and the Free Will Offering Fund have enabled us to send contributions from St. Peter's, Hambledon to a number of worthy causes. The need for this support is great and our help is always greatly appreciated. The following extracts from letters we have received from the headquarters of the Societies will speak for themselves. DR. BARNADO'S HOMES. "Please accept our grateful thanks for your kind donation of £25. 0. 0. It is most welcome and I can assure you that it will help our children. The boys and girls in our care have special needs and we try to do our best to fulfil them. The work is undertaken today in the self same spirit of devoted service and is as dependent on public and private generosity as it has always been."

SOUTH AMERICAN MISSIONARY SOCIETY "Your gift just received is most warmly welcome, the more so since we have decided to continue our policy of expansion in all our fields next year, and will consequently need an extra £17,000 income over that which we expect to have received by the end of 1963".

THE MISSIONS TO SEAMEN "I am writing on behalf of the Council to thank you for your very welcome gift to our Society. I should like to convey, through you, the expression of our appreciation to all who contributed in any way to this generous support.... Bishop Stephen Bayne (Toronto Report) has written 'much still remains to be done, if every Church of our Communion is to accept its responsible part in ministry to seamen, whose life is so uniquely international and inter-Anglican. '"

THE MISSION TO LEPERS "Thousands of sufferers from leprosy, even if they were not inarticulate, would find it quite impossible to communicate with all the folk to whom they are grateful. So it becomes my happy lot to act as a link between them and you. Impersonal -? not really, because all your giving and our passing on of your gifts are in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ and His Spirit binds us together in this service".

BRITISH RED CROSS SOCIETY "Our Branch Finance Committee has considered the generous donation which the Hambledon Parochial Church Council sent us recently, and have decided that it should be allocated to our Compassionate Fund. This Fund is available for making gifts to elderly, sick and convalescent people who have such needs at the particular time the grant is made. These

are such needs as convalescence, holidays for those who are unable to afford them, supplies of coal during the winter months and a variety of other things."

COMMONWEALTH AND CONTINENTAL CHURCH SOCIETY "I am enclosing our receipt for the further large and unexpected donation we have received from Hambledon Church" (This Society was faced with a heavy deficit in 1963, and headquarters expenses were reduced to a minimum in order that their present grants to needy areas overseas may be continued.
