# ANNUAL VESTRY AND PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING At Hambledon Rectory, Monday, March 13th 1967 at 8.0 p.m.

The Churchwardens will be elected at the meeting. The business of the annual parochial Church meeting will include the receiving of a copy of the electoral roll from the Barochial Church Council. An annual report on the proceedings of the council and the financial affairs of the parish: a report on the fabric and goods of the Church. The audited accounts of the council for the year ended December 31st. 1966 will be presented.

Representatives of the laity to the Parochial Church Council will be elected. Sidesmen will be elected.

WHAT IS THE ELECTORAL ROLL?

This is the Churches Register of Electors, the list of those qualified to attend and vote at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting.

Who is qualified to have his name on the Roll?

Persons aged seventeen years and upwards who are baptised and declare that they are members of the Church of England and that they do not belong to any other religious body which is not in communion with the Church of England; and are resident in the parish, or if not so resident have habitually attended public worship in the parish during a period of six months prior to enrolment and have signed the form of application for enrolment.

N.B. The ecclesiastical parish boundaries are not identical with the civil parish boundaries at Hambledon.

Enrolment forms may be obtained from the Rector, or from the Parochial Church Council Secretary.

LET'S BURN THE BIBLE:

A few years ago, it would not have been thought so very unusual to consider having a Bible-burning bonfire - in the days when its translation into English was not only new, but a thing of great controversy. Then people died for the Bible; they died to print it and they died to read it.

Christians believe that men and women need to know about God. They believe that the Bible is the

only book which God has definitely inspired for telling people about Himself. So I suppose one could truthfully say that there is a sense in which people can die for the want of the Bible, or at any rate for the want of its contents.

Yet today the situation is such that although our society would hesitate to burn the Bible because it has a kind of special position in our thinking and is still a world best-seller, its effectiveness is, perhaps, far less than it was in those early days when it was first translated. Perhaps more people today are dying without it than

in those days died for it.

Of course, it has to be admitted that the regular practice of Bible-reading is not easy and Christians always find that it is the spiritually profitable things which are most easily overlocked the devil makes sure of that. Yet those who put aside a small part of each day to kneel before God to talk to Him and to open His book to let Him talk to them always find - without exception - that their lives are richer and fuller for it. There are problems, yes, but daily Bible-reading is contained in a Christian's life-blood, and although we make all sorts of excuses for not doing it, we need to face the fact that only we are sufferers if we fail to have this tryst with God.

As Bible Reading Promotion Secretary of Scripture Union, I have spent the last thirteen months encouraging people to read their Bibles regularly, and have heard many sorts of men& women who have had a lifetime of this daily communion with God. All speak of the benefits which they have received from it.

If you have read to the end of this article, you are capable of reading your Bible every day and receiving the same benefits for yourself.
