Then followed films illustrating the difficulties of "shooting" politicians, and vivid shots of explosions and rescue work in Belfast showing the courage and technical skill of reporters and camera-men, and then, in contrast, colourful pictures of celebrations in Persia.

Mr. Haviland ended by showing I.T.V. pictures of himself in Rhodesia, soaking wet after a dash of hundreds of miles in a heavy storm, interviewing Mrs. Garfield Todd just after her husband and daughter had been arrested.

The Rector, who welcomed Mr. Haviland, particularly as a one-time member of the Fellowship, also manned the cine-projector kindly lent by Mr. R. G. Williams from the Institute of Oceanography.

Mrs. D. Ellingson thanked the speaker, and the Rector closed with an epilogue.

things. It included a morning in No. 1 Court at Guildford, and she spoke of motoring offences, petty pilfering, shop-lifting and the refusing or granting of bail on surety. When she got home she was rung up by the police who wanted her to see a man they had just found. Then someone came to her house to have documents signed and witnessed. HAMBLEDON VILLAGE SCRAP-BOOK - EXTRACT VI

Some old women, not only in Hambledon but in other villages as well, were thought to be witches. And in Hambledon there was a superstition that a witch had laid a spell on the road at Beech Hill and that horses used to stop when they came to the place.

Besides the personal reminiscences of Hambledon, here are a few more items of interest, collected from various sources:

The Manor. The word manor comes from the old French Manoir, a mansion, and was not therefore used until after the conquest. The "Lord" of the Manor owned some of the land in the Manor, and exercise various rights and enjoyed various services from the people living on his land, in their differing degrees of freedom and servitude.
