PARISH COUNCIL NOTES - ISSUE No. 5

The Parish Council met on 25th February, with all Members present except Mrs Major who had only recently left hospital.

DISTRICT REPRESENTATION Major Mervyn-Smith is considering resigning as Hambledon's representative on the District Council because he is unable to take time off during the day to attend site meetings or meet council officers, and therefore feels that he is not able to give a full service to the village. The Parish Council asked Major Mervyn-Smith to reconsider his decision, and he has agreed to continue until a successor comes forward.

<u>VILLAGE POND</u> Several volunteers turned up to start the initial clearance of trees and scrub for the new pond, and good progress was made. More help is needed however - every Saturday morning from 10 till 12.

MORMLEY LANE The fight for street nameplate continues, backed by further recent instances of the delayed arrival of "lost" emergency services.

HAMBLEDON HOMES No new information has been received and the Parish Council is concerned about the danger of vandalism. Individual Members are keeping an eye on the site, and everyone is urged to report any suspicious activity to the police.
