ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING

The Annual Parochial Church Meeting was held in the Village Hall on Friday, 2nd April. The Rector opened the meeting with prayer and welcomed some 45 parishioners. Mr. C. A. Chapman and Mr. C. A. Cronhelm were re-elected church-wardens.

Mrs. Adgie, Miss Denny, Mrs. Ellingson and Mr. Gordon retired from the P.C.C. at the conclusion of their term of office and Mrs. R. Jervis was elected to the Council for three years.

The sidesmen were re-elected en bloc.

Mr. N. H. Head, the electoral roll officer, reported there were 218 on the roll, an increase of 15 over last year.

The accounts were presented by Mr. Chapman, the Treasurer, and revealed a healthy state of affairs. Lower expenditure and increased collections had enabled us to make more generous grants and donations and many appreciative letters had been received. Two thirds of our church's income came from free-will offerings which had increased again, due to the hard work of Miss Denny, but more subscribers would be needed in future to offset the lower income tax rebate on covenants.

Reports were also made on the activities of the P.C.C., the Deanery Synod, the Church Fellowship, the magazine and the "fabric, goods and ornaments" of the church.

The Rector referred to the duty of the clergy and laity jointly to promote in the parish the whole mission of the church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. He thanked all those who had helped individually and collectively to support the church and its activities during the past year.

A particularly happy item at the meeting was the presentation of cutlery by Miss Parker, on behalf of the whole congregation, to Miss Jennifer Hill, the organist, on her forthcoming marriage.

Refreshments were served after the meeting.
