

ANNUAL CHURCH MEETING - Brief Report

Held in Hambledon Village Hall at 8 p.m. on Monday, 9th April 1973. Messrs. C.A. Chapman and P.E.G. Roderick were re-elected churchwardens and were thanked for the valued services they had rendered to the parish during the past year. The following were elected to represent the parish on the Deanery Synod: Mrs. N. Jervis, Mr. C.A. Chapman and Dr. J. Symonds. Representatives of the laity to the Parochial Church Council were also elected. The electoral roll secretary, Mr. P. Roderick, stated that there were now 189 members on the roll. The Church Council Secretary, Mr. T.W. Grillo, gave a report of the Council's activities during the In the absence of the Hon. Treasuprevious year. rer, Mr. C.A. Chapman, the financial report was presented by Mr. Roderick who stated that a very satisfactory position is shown by the accounts. It was noted that collections at the Sunday services A slight decrease in the Freewill had increased. Offering contributions was due largely to the decrease in income tax last year which resulted in a decrease in the amount recovered on Covenanted subscriptions. Because repairs to the church fabric had been relatively light, it had been possible to increase some of the donations to Home and Overseas Missions. The total distribution was £1,296, a substantial increase over last year's £1,054 which was given for work outside the parish. The Church itself and its furniture is in good condition, but it is likely that heavier repairs will

accrue in 1973 and an overhaul of the organ, which is now necessary, will cost approximately £250. Miss E. F. Denny, Free-Will Offering Fund Secretary, gave her report and was thanked for her untiring efforts for the Fund. Magazine and Church Fellowship fund reports were also presented. The meeting approved the accounts, which had been audited by Mr. C.J. Wilson, and gratitude was expressed to Mr. Chapman for his services to the parish. meeting appointed Mr. Wilson as Auditor in succession to the late Mrs. C.A. Cronhelm. Mr. Wilson was thanked for having undertaken the audit at short notice this year. Dr. J. Symonds presented a report on the Deanery Synod's work during the previous year. In the absence of Mr. Williams, the magazine secretary, the Rector gave a short report concerning the magazine and stated that conmencing in May there would be a slight increase in the size of the local notes and a new inset, "News Extra", published by the Marcham Manor Press, would be issued. The inclusion of this new inset would coincide with the commencement of "Mission Unlimited" on Whitsunday this year. Mrs. J. Symonds gave a report of the meetings of the Women's Fellowship and thanked Mrs. Ellingson for kindly arranging for them to be held in her home. A report about the meetings of the Church Fellowship was also given. and it was noted that an excellent programme had been provided, and the meetings well attended.

In presenting his report, the Rector referred to the great loss the Church in Hambledon had suffered by the death last year of one of the churchwardens, Mr. Claude Cronhelm, and also his wife Vera, who died the same day. They had both given devoted service to the parish over many years and were greatly missed. The Rector expressed his thanks to all the church officers and helpers and made special reference to Mr. Chapman's long service as churchwarden, and to Mr. Roderick's willingness to take over duties following the death of Mr. Cronhelm. Mrs. Andrew Thorne, whose service as organist had been so much appreciated, had now left the

district and her departure had been much regretted. Recent church attendance had been encouraging, as had attendances at the Bible studies. Reference was made to "Mission Unlimited" and the year of preparation commencing on Whitsunday. The object of the Mission was "To Make Christ Known", and the Church Council had decided that the preparation should commence with a series of studies, "What Christianity Is" and "Evangelism". The Rector concluded that before we can make Christ known, we must first be certain that we know Him ourselves. After the meeting, refreshments were served by lady members of the Church Council, with the help of Mrs. Jeffery.

Hambledon Women's Institute held their March Meeting on 14th March, at 2.45 p.m. at Hambledon Village Hall.

The President, Mrs. Steele, welcoming the speaker, Mrs. Cecil-Clarke, said that she was not only one of their own members, but also an official speaker for the National Trust, and was able to use the Trust slides to illustrate her talk.

Mrs. Cecil-Clarke began by briefly telling the story of the foundation of the National Trust by Canon Rawnsley, of the Lake District, Miss Octavia Hill, who worked in London, and Sir Robert Hunter, who was especially interested in Surrey. She went on to describe some of the houses and gardens which now belong to the Trust. Members enjoyed her stories about some of the past owners of the properties, and "oohs" greeted many of her lovely colour slides of such places as Haddon Hall, Killerton, Sissinghurst and Blaize Hamlet near Bristol.

Miss Judith Ledeboer thanked Mrs. Cecil Clarke on behalf of the Institute for her talk, and reminded members how many local places in and near Hambledon were part of the National Trust, and appealed for more members for the Trust.
