CHURCH ANNUAL MEETING News in brief

38 members came throughwet and cold to the Annual Parochial Church Meeting in the Village Hall on 10 April.

Church Officers Warm thanks were given to our clected officers: Churchwardens, Deanery Snod representatives, FCC members, Sidesmen and Auditor. The Rector and people together reclected Mr. Cecil Chapman and Mr. Peter Roderick as Churchwardens. The Sidesmen were re-elected, and Mr. Harper as Hon. Auditor. Of the Parochial Church Council, Mrs. Ellingson, Mr. Heath and Mrs. Jeffery after serving for three years are not eligible this year, and Mr. Tom Arden-White, Mrs. Pettit, and Mr. Ray Williams were elected in their place.

Reports Electoral Roll: Mr. Poter Roderik reported that the official church membership had grown during the year from 198 to 213.

PCC Report Mr. Tom Grillo, having been thanked for his work as Secretary, gave a short report of the work of the Council during the year. Finances: Mr. Chapman presented the 1974 accounts (available for inspection at the Church door), Miss Denny the Free Will Offering figures, Mr. Williams the magazine accounts, and Mr. Rodcrick the report on Parish Fellowship. Compared with 1973, church offerings had grown by about £100, but expenditure by about £500, and missionary giving had doclined by £150. Everything will cost more during 1975, and especially oil for heating and electricity. Our giving will also have to grow distinctly to match this. meeting expressed some concern about the state of the church-yard which was not cut so well as in the past. Mombers were also unhappy about the present arrangements for the Easter Offering and asked the PCC to give further thought to this matter.

Buildings and Froperty The five-year survey of the Church had just been received. Some treatment for woodworm was needed, but otherwise only minor repair, and all was being done. The Rectory also is in good order, and Diocese and PCC had together carried out some improvements and decorating there when the new Rector arrived. The only big expense foreseen is the thorough overhaul and renovation of the church organ,

which will have to be done shortly.

Deanery Synod Dr. Jack Synonds8 short report made this sound both interesting and surprisingly good fun. (A summary of the Rector's report is left over until next month)
