THE RECTOR WRITES

" PRAY .. for sovereigns and all in positions of responsibility .. so that our common life may be lived in peace and quiet, with a proper sense of God and of our responsibility to Him ". (I. Timothy 2)

To pray is the most important thing we can do at this election time. Nothing matters more for the wellbeing of the nations than that they should have THE RIGHT LEADERS. We should be praying for good government in Iran, in Uganda, in Rhodesia; and now at this time of the formation of a new government, in our own country.

In a democracy like ours (where thank God we are free to choose, and to choose secretly, without coercion) our prayer comes to be a prayer that God will guide THE MINDS OF THE VOTERS AND OF OURSELVES: that we may listen carefully to both sides of a question: that we may be able to crossexamine what we hear, or what we read in our usual newspaper: that we may have a good judgement. If, as we are told, a specially large number of the electorate is still not settled in mind, and the election may well turn on this, we need specially to pray for this good judgement during the next few days.

On the election day itself, most will be clear enough in mind to vote; and it will be right to do so, fulfilling God's creation command to exercise dominion in the world God gave to be our home. If we are still not clear (i.e. if the rights and wrongs of the various issues seem equally divided between the parties) we may honestly be unable to vote. But pray we can, and pray we must.

May God help us to choose well, for the good of all.

MARY HILDER LASSETER

"Molly" Lasseter has died suddenly at the age of 80, after the happiest possible day spent partly in the company of her grandchildren. She came with her husband to Godalming in 1935. During the war years when her husband was away on duty with the Fire Service, she not only brought up the boys but ran the High Street shop, and was also Billetting Officer for evacuees from London. She was Mayoress in Coronation Year when her husband was Mayor; she served as Magistrate for many years, indeed until only seven years ago; and she is remembered too for her work as Chairman of the Godalming Committee for the Blind. Though the last years brought failing strength and badly failing eyesight, she was always a happy person: She had too a very real personal faith, and it was a pleasure to us all when her husband was able to guide her steps into Hambledon Church for a morning service or for Communion. We specially remember her close relatives now.

Sheila Vaughan, the wife of the doctor at Kisiizi Hospital, has written as follows:-

"It is always a joy to receive your parcels, and we thank the Lord that they arrive safely and intact. All the contents are used, and are useful; and if people like yourselves did not give so generously, the hospital would be very lacking in some essentials, especially sheets, blankets, bandages, and surgical gloves. We enjoy too, the 'soft centre' and indeed we are grateful to all of you who contribute, whether in terms of money or kind. Thank you very much."
