I am grateful to Canon Oldham for this quotation from the closing words of Archbishop Willhiam Temple's great sermon at the opening of the 1930 Lambeth Conference: -

"While we deliberate, He reigns; when wo decide wisely, He reigns; when we decide foolishly, He reigns; when we serve Him selfassertively. He reighe; when we serve Him in humble loyalty, He reigns; when we rebel and seek to withold service, He reigns - for He is the Alpha and Omega, which was, and is, and is to come, the Almighty."

The way in which cur Lord chose to mark His transition from our world of space and sight and touch into the eternal world shows us eloquently that He is on top, in charge of every situation. # 4. NOTES OF THE ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING

ELECTIONS:-

Wardens: Cecil Chapman and Peter Roderick.

Deanery Synod: Mrs G.M. Bolton, Cecil Chapman, and Nigel Pollock. (Major Piers de Berniere-Smart and Dr Jack Symonds were warmly thanked as they retire now).

Farochial Church Council: Tom Arden-White, Mrs F. Gardner, and Roger Mitchell now retire after their three years. Edric Hardy, Mrs J. Lewis, and Jeremy Sewell were elected (to join The Wardens, the Synod Representatives, Mrs M. Caroe, Tom Grillo, Miss Mary Parker, David Smith, Brig. Michael Stevens, and Ray Williams).

Sidesmen: All the present sidemen were reelected, and John Hassard-Short was added.

REPORTS:-

Parochial Church Council: The Secretary's succinct report mentioned action on Car Parking, Church repairs following the quinquennial survey, augmentation of the lighting to the Church, the raising of the price of the magazine to 5p, and consideration of proposals for the Benefices Neasure dealing with the appointment of clergy to parishes.

<u>linances</u>: The Treasurer, who was unable to be present through sickness, has prepared a vritten report, and this, together with the audited accounts, is publicly posted on the notice board in the Church porch. The gross income increased last year to a record £9718, but expenditure also inevitably increased (to £6895). £250 was placed to the contingency reserve for the current repairs, and outward giving to Home & Foreign Missions was held at the same total as last year, £2572. Of our expenditure, 31½% is for the maintenance of

Church and Services, 31% goes to the Diocese

for Quota, Parsonages Board and Stipend augmentati n,  $8\frac{1}{2}\%$  is for the Rectory

maintenance and expenses,  $2\frac{1}{2}\%$  was placed to contingency reserve, and  $26\frac{1}{2}\%$  to Home and Foreign Missions. The special appeal for the current repairs had realised £730 by the end of 1981 and has since grown to £1650.
