





Dear Friends

Have you ever seen the film *Nuns on the Run*? Eric Idle and Robbie Coltrane play crooks, on the run from both the Mob and the police – so (obviously...) they disguise themselves as nuns, and hide in convent. This convent has a school attached to it, and Eric finds himself about to teach a lesson on the Trinity. Robbie tells him that it's easy – all he has to remember is that God is like a shamrock – one leaf, but also three leaves. So Eric tries to teach class, which of course is total chaos with the girls all asking questions he can't answer, and in his panic he ends up telling them that God is like a shamrock – small, green and split three ways...

People often get hung up on the Trinity – the idea that God is one God, but with three persons within. They think it's weird or too complicated to understand; it's like it's an optional extra for very clever Christians to believe. When I wanted to preach on it back when I was training for ordination, my vicar said I shouldn't bother because people just wouldn't understand it. But I did anyway! Because I think it's very important, even fundamental to the Christian faith – and because I don't think it's that hard really! And this month, on the 18th, we celebrate Trinity Sunday.

The Trinity is only hard if we try to tidy it up, to make it into a neat mathematical formula, to make sense of it. We can't do that because one doesn't equal three however hard you try! So we try drawing a picture — usually three over-lapping circles like a scaled down Olympic symbol — but the fact remains that two things can't be in same space at same time — they either have to go on top of, or beside, or mixed together.

Sometimes sound can help rather than pictures a musical chord of three notes: we hear one whole, complete sound, but we can also hear the three separate notes sounding within it. Three in one, one in three. Or what about a dance? Imagine a beautiful waltz – both partners are needed to form the dance: you can't have one without the other. The man's steps only make sense when put together with woman's, and vice versa. To be complete a dance needs two persons; to be complete God needs three.

These ideas might help, but no one model will explain the whole thing; we can't take it to bits like a machine and see how it works. The Trinity is both beautifully simple and wonderfully mysterious: at the heart of God is a loving relationship between the Father, Jesus the Son, and the Holy Spirit. God is one in three and three in one.

God exists in a loving relationship – He is not one, big unknowable thing "out there"; neither is he three separate bits, but He is Trinity – a loving relationship between Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. That's why Christians can say "God is love" – because there's love within God, love between the three persons of God. After all, love is only love when it has an object, a beloved: love needs to be shown to someone or something else. You or I can show love, we can act lovingly, but we can't be love. So to say "God is love" only makes sense if God is Trinity – three in one and one in three – Father, Son and Holy Spirit in an eternal relationship of love.

And he made us to share in that relationship: to join in a dance of love at the heart of God. The love in God overflows to embrace you and me. This is a love that is personal and

Christian Basics: What Does the Holy Spirit Do?

Like a powerful searchlight, the aim of the Holy Spirit is to highlight Christ and enable us to live the Christian life. Therefore, it is important to ask the crucial question: what does the Holy Spirit do in our lives?

The Spirit brings us new birth into the family of God, for without him we cannot develop our relationship with God. Every person who has committed their life to Christ possesses the Holy Spirit, as Paul says, 'if anyone does not have the Spirit of Christ, he does not belong to Christ.' (Romans 8:9).

Primarily the Spirit assures us of God's love and acceptance in our lives, despite our fears, doubts or failures: 'God's love has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit, who has been given to us' (Romans 5:5). Paul expresses this in terms of our adoption as sons and our new status, family and future: 'Because you are his sons, God sent the Spirit of his Son into our hearts, the Spirit who calls out, "Abba, Father."

So you are no longer slaves, but God's children; and since you are his children, he has made you also heirs' (Galatians 4: 6,7). This means that we can now address God as father ie abba, which is Aramaic for 'daddy', the very word used by Jesus himself. We can struggle with this truth in our experience, perhaps as a result of authority figures (eg parents, teachers etc), who have been domineering, withdrawn or abusive. However, the Spirit will work within us to bring healing and release in our lives.

As the Helper (or Counsellor) the Holy Spirit is also alongside to enable us to pray: 'In the same way, the Spirit helps us in our weakness. We do not know what we ought to pray for, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us through wordless groans'. (Romans 8:26). For our prayers he gives us both words understood, unknown words (ie gift of tongues) or no words at all (ie tears or sighs). He will also help us to understand God's word and hear what God is saying to us. 'But when he, the Spirit of truth, comes, he will guide you into all truth'. (John 16:13).

'The presence of the Spirit, as an experience and living reality, is the crucial matter for the Christian life from beginning to end' (Gordon Fee).

Get moving!

Three hours of moderate to vigorous exercise a week can slow the ageing process and give you a body 10 years younger than someone who takes little to no exercise.





The German Air Crash at Lodge Bottom (Part 5)

As her investigations into the crashed Heinkel bomber progressed, Lady Gillian Brunton, the present owner of the land off Hambledon Road on which the plane crashed, learned the names of the German air crew, what role each had played and their dates of birth. They were no longer anonymous Germans, but young men of flesh and blood who had lost their lives when far too young to die.

Her original idea was to mark with a plaque the exact spot where the plane had come down in the field opposite the gates of Busbridge Lakes but, as she learned more about them, this seemed to be too impersonal and inadequate: they should be given their own unique memorial.

It is not difficult to find the details and the resting places of airmen who were killed and buried in this country; survivors are another matter, and so the search for Heinrich Berg continued. Nevertheless, she decided to make a statue to honour the dead and to give thanks for the survivor.

A visit to the Imperial War Museum proved most helpful and she soon learned everything that she needed to know about Luftwaffe uniforms worn by bomber crews at this time.

An experienced model-maker, Derek Jones, helped her make the metal armature (frame) from an old bedstead. Wood, chicken wire and polystyrene were wired around the 'skeleton' to bulk out the form. The first two attempts were foiled when the statue keeled over due to the weight of the clay. A friend came to the rescue by welding heavy-gauge metal to support the original frame.

Her problem was that she was working 'blind', for she had no idea of the build of the surviving airman, his height or what he looked like. At this stage she knew only his date of birth and that he had not been killed; a photograph would have been a great help! She sculpted the face three times before she felt happy with it.

As this was her first attempt at a full-sized figure~ she had no idea of the amount and weight of clay and plaster that were needed. She was working in a room upstairs, above the sitting room as the ceiling started to sag. To avert disaster, two telegraph poles were cut to size and put under a beam, in the middle of the room, to bear the weight. It was a great relief once the mould could be removed and the clay figure dismantled. Safely on the concrete floor of the garage, the long and laborious task of making the fibreglass and bronze statue from the mould continued.

Several weeks after the figure was finished and after months of correspondence with various authorities in Germany, one can only imagine the excitement when Gillian received this fax in January 1997:

Dear Mrs. Brunton, I got the information that you want to know my address. I live in [address in Lohne, W Germany]. Please tell me why do you want to know it. Yours sincerely, Heinrich Berg.

After several letters had passed between Gillian and Heinrich, he sent her a photo of himself as a young airman: the likeness was uncanny and it was hard to believe that he had not sat in person for the sculpture.

Fifty-six years to the day after the crash, the statue was dedicated at a private ceremony on 9 April 1997. It was a simple but moving affair attended by about 30 people, mainly family and friends, together with others who had been involved with the project. Sadly, Heinrich Berg

Life in the 1500's

The next time you are washing your hands and complain because the water temperature isn't just how you like it, think about how things used to be. Here are some facts about the 1500s:

Most people got married in June because they took their yearly bath in May, and still smelled pretty good by June. However, they were starting to smell, so brides carried a bouquet of flowers to hide the body odour. Hence the custom today of carrying a bouquet when getting married.

Baths consisted of a big tub filled with hot water. The man of the house had the privilege of the nice clean water, then all the other sons and men, then the women and finally the children. Last of all the babies. By then the water was so dirty you could actually lose someone in it. Hence the saying, Don't throw the baby out with the Bath water..

Houses had thatched roofs thick straw-piled high, with no wood underneath. It was the only place for animals to get warm, so all the cats and other small animals (mice, bugs) lived in the roof. When it rained it became slippery and sometimes the animals would slip and fall off the roof. Hence the saying .. It's raining cats and dogs.

There was nothing to stop things from falling into the house. This posed a real problem in the bedroom where bugs and other droppings could mess up your nice clean bed. Hence, a bed with big posts and a sheet hung over the top afforded some protection. That's how canopy beds came into existence.

The floor was dirt. Only the wealthy had something other than dirt. Hence the saying, Dirt poor. The wealthy had slate floors that would get slippery in the winter when wet, so they spread thresh (straw) on floor to help keep their footing. As the winter wore on, they added more thresh until, when you opened the door, it would all start slipping outside. A piece of wood was placed in the entrance way. Hence the saying a thresh hold.

(Getting quite an education, aren't you?)


In those old days, they cooked in the kitchen with a big kettle that always hung over the fire. Every day they lit the fire and added things to the pot. They are mostly vegetables and did not get much meat. They would eat the stew for dinner, leaving leftovers in the pot to get cold overnight and then start over the next day. Sometimes stew had food in it that had been there for quite a while. Hence the rhyme, Peas porridge hot, peas porridge cold, peas porridge in the pot nine days old..

Sometimes they could obtain pork, which made them feel quite special. When visitors came over, they would hang up their bacon to show off. It was a sign of wealth that a man could bring home the bacon. They would cut off a little to share with guests and would all sit around and chew the fat..

Those with money had plates made of pewter. Food with high acid content caused some of the lead to leach onto the food, causing lead poisoning death. This happened most often with tomatoes, so for the next 400 years or so, tomatoes were considered poisonous.

Bread was divided according to status. Workers got the burnt bottom of the loaf, the family got the middle, and guests got the top, or the upper crust.


Lead cups were used to drink ale or whiskey. The combination would sometimes knock the imbibers out for a couple of days. Someone walking along the road would take them for dead and prepare them for burial. They were laid out on the kitchen table for a couple of days and

The Village Shop

Some months ago I wrote about prices going up, shortages and even famine. The first has happened and now the second is underway. You will have read that countries are beginning to ban the export of basic foodstuffs as they don't have enough for their own people. Rice, wheat, maize and soya are the main ones. So where does this leave us? Are we growing enough to support our population? What happens if France and Germany close the doors as they need all they can produce? All the people in this country will need food (and water). Where are our farms that can supply this need? The government has hit them on the head and failed to support them. Building on farmland to provide homes for all these extra people won't produce food. Horses and recreational parks don't produce food. Lumping extra welfare issues on our farmers doesn't produce food. Take the case of eggs. In four years time egg farmers are being forced to alter all their battery cages into larger ones. This will cost the industry many millions of pounds. So what are most of them saying? Answer-they will stop in four years. Where will all the eggs come from? Answer-Middle Europe-if they have any to spare. How will they keep the hens? Answer-in the small battery cages! A similar thing is happening with pork.

All this is relevant to us in the Village Shop. We must support Local English farms. We try as hard as we can to obtain their produce, but even this is slowly disappearing. If we don't support them and buy, say ,asparagus flown in from Brazil, we are all lost. Isn't the taste of our English tomatoes better. So please, start turning your backs on the Supermarkets, they might soon start running out of food. Support the Village Shop, and in a small way help our farmers. Help even more by clicking on the website of Farmfreshexpress (Google), registering as a customer of the village shop, and doing a weekly order of local produce before Tuesday midnight for delivery to the shop on Friday morning. One might have to do this soon, as the supermarket shelves become emptier!

GOD IN THE ARTS

The Rev Michael Burgess continues his series on God in the Arts with a famous painting by Dirk Bouts. It is found in the church of St Peter in Leuven.

A MEAL TO REMEMBER

When we gather with other Christians to celebrate the eucharist and to make our communion, we are remembering that special meal Jesus shared with his disciples on the eve of his arrest and death. I wonder if we always appreciate what we



are doing. Sometimes the monotony of repetition and distractions will get in the way. We fail to recognise Christ's gift at communion for what it truly is. Thursday, 22 May is a special day when we focus with heart and mind on that gift of holy communion offered to us each time we come together to make eucharist.

Perhaps we could try and focus not just with heart and mind on that day, but with imagination as well. Then we might see our face with the faces of the disciples at that Last Supper, and Jesus offering us the bread and wine, saying those words, 'This is my body' and 'This is my blood.' In the 15th century the prosperous burghers of the Flemish town of Leuven wanted to celebrate the 200th anniversary of this feast of Corpus Christi. They commissioned the artist Dirk Bouts to paint a special altarpiece devoted to the Eucharist for the church of St Peter. Dirk Bouts with his imagination portrayed the Last Supper in a room looking out to his own town of Louvain. The faces of the servers in the room and the cooks looking through the hatch were modelled on the burghers who commissioned the work.

Other faces are modelled on theologians at the new university who visited the artist. They wanted to ensure he kept his theological feet on the ground while his imagination took flight. And so around the scene of the Last Supper, Bouts has painted Old Testament scenes foreshadowing that holy communion: Melchizedek offering bread and wine in return for Abraham's offering, the eating of the first Passover, the gathering of the manna in the wilderness, and Elijah wakened by the angel to eat and drink before setting out for Horeb. Signs of sacrifice, the Passover of the old covenant, daily food and food for the journey – all key aspects of the communion we celebrate and share in.

Just as the theological faculty reminded Dirk Bouts of all these facets, so the artist is reminding us of the richness of the distinctive meal we have as Christians. When we see the bread and wine taken up and offered, we remember not only the Last Supper, when Jesus fed his disciples with the sacrifice of his life, but those occasions when God reached out to feed his people of old. We rejoice that the food our Lord gives us in the eucharist feeds us now and enables us to make our journey through life to the eternal banquet offered in the heavenly kingdom.

Des' Deliberations

To continue from last month, When I asked Stella if she would like to hear what the Bible said about this thing called "salvation". She answered with a very firm, "Yes Please, I would like that very much".

I told her that the most important thing to bear in mind was that God loved her, as much as He had ever loved anyone, and that he knew her by name.

Not only that, but God is Holy and Just and cannot live where there is sin. I told her that we all are sinners in need of forgiveness, not only forgiveness but having the whole slate wiped clean.

Jesus Christ came to this earth to do just that. I read to her John 3 verse 16

- 16 "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.
- 17 For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through him.
- Whoever believes in him is not condemned, but whoever does not believe stands condemned already because he has not believed in the name of God's one and only Son. (NIV)

I said to Stella, "You know all about this, don't you". She answered, "Yes". "Have you done anything about it". I asked. "No", she answered. "Would you like to", I asked. "Yes, I would like to very much".

I led her in a prayer to ask the Lord Jesus to forgive her and come into her life and make her a new person as only He can. When we finished praying I looked at her face, it seemed a great load had been lifted from her, which it had.

The next day Bryan's wife Ruth went to visit Stella, she was drifting in and out of consciousness, Ruth thought she heard the word "frightened". She said to Stella "Are you frightened Stella". "Not any more", she answered. Stella died soon after.

When I had a heart bypass operation several years back a chap came in the night before I came home. He was given a bed opposite mine. A doctor came in to talk about the operation the next day. The first thing he said was ,"Have you put your affairs in order". The chap in the bed was distraught, when the doctor left he shakily said, "I'm going to die tomorrow". I pointed out that the medics surely would not be carrying out the operation if they thought it was a waste of time. I also said that I was a Christian and that I truly believed in a wonderful life after dying . I then asked much the same as I asked Stella. I was quite surprised that not one of the five men in the ward who had had a "Brush with the last enemy" or the terrified one still to have his operation wanted to know.

I felt it was better to face death with HOPE than None

- 9 That if you confess with your mouth, "Jesus is Lord," and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved.
- 10 For it is with your heart that you believe and are justified, and it is with your mouth that you confess and are saved.
- 11 As the Scripture says, "Anyone who trusts in him will never be put to shame."
- 12 For there is no difference between Jew and Gentile the same Lord is Lord of all and richly blesses all who call on him,
- 13 for, "Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved."

Crispin Hill died very recently and his wife Christine found this personal testament when working through some of his papers. It is re-printed here in the hope that others will find it helpful.

A Personal Testament

Crispin Hill

"NOT OF WORKS" (Eph 2: 8/9)

I was brought up in the Church of England and am more than grateful to my parents for teaching me the Bible Stories and for taking me regularly to Church. They taught me the habit of prayer that is still with me today I also learned the Catechism. It is one of the curious things however that the Church of England Services do not immediately reveal the basic doctrine of Christianity - "Not of Works. It is possible to grow up with the idea that God expects a certain standard from us which we may or may not reach and that on the basis of our success in keeping His laws He will one day accept us. The idea can easily grow in a child's mind that our life is a kind of weighing machine. "If the good outweighs the bad we shall one day go to Heaven". Christ's life and death in all their wonder are simply a wonderful example, an added extra to help us on the way.

CART BEFORE HORSE

It was not until I reached University that it was pointed out to me that this is putting the cart before the horse. Yes, we must seek to please God in our lives, but that is the consequence, not the basis of our Faith. I learned that there is <u>nothing</u> that we can do to earn our acceptance with God. All the work has been done by Jesus. Without Him, however good we may think we are our goodness is nothing as compared with His perfect standard. Our failure and wrong-doing create a barrier between ourselves and God which the Bible says results in separation from Him in the end. We know the evil in our hearts, of course, but Christianity is a burdensome thing until we realise that the guilt of our Sin has been paid for by Jesus on the Cross and that once we trust in and accept His forgiveness the guilt aspect of our sin is settled for the past, present and future. We have eternal life which starts now!

JOY AND SECURITY

This was the wonderful gospel, the good news, which first thrilled me at University and which is still the underpinning of my life; today, giving a joy and security in life which my own unworthiness cannot alter. Presumption? I don't think so. After all, I have simply accepted Jesus' wonderful offer which is open to everyone who hears. "He who believes in me <u>has</u> everlasting life." "Come unto me."

Mind you, that is only the start. Life with Christ is never easy, we are far from perfect and there is so much to learn. We need constant cleansing by the way, but the "works" we do are done out of love and gratitude to Him, not to gain his acceptance.



Success



The plants seem confused with the spells of extreme and unusual warmth in February encouraging growth and leaf formation only to be nipped in the bud by 6 degrees of frost one April night. The Magnolias seemed to suffer most and are a sorry sight all through the village, of scorched brown blooms. Perhaps the cold wind is sent to remind gardeners not to race ahead with Spring and Summer plantings. Earthworm does not relish the cold earth and no more do transplants or seeds. It is difficult to be patient when Spring might be just around the corner.

Floor 4 - These men have jobs, love kids, are ultra-handsome and help with housework.





Wildlife Gardening in May

This is the busiest month of the year for wildlife. Insects start to move in their masses looking for flowers, such as hawthorn blossom, wild cherry and bluebells which provide early nectar and pollen. The splashes of colour are touched by early butterflies such as brimstone, orange tip and peacock. Hedgehogs are seen in the undergrowth and tadpoles are growing in the pond. Look out for swifts, swallows or house martins arriving.

Tasks of the month

- Lift and divide early flowers such as primrose or snowdrop.
- Prune spring flowering bushes after flowering, particularly if they have grown too big for their space, such as flowering currant.
- Plant hanging baskets.
- Transplant container plants into new pots or change their compost.
- Start your weed control programme. Some weeds are valuable for insects, others are aggressive and in certain areas, such as rockeries, need to be controlled.

Bird Cherry Tree

A smaller relative of the wild cherry named because of the fruit, which although bitter to human taste, is eaten by birds. This is a native of woods and hedgerows, with white flowers in late spring and then black bitter cherries in late summer. It is best to plant these young trees, which grow to a height of between one and two metres, in autumn and early spring when the weather is suitable. They have heavenly scented clusters of blossom which attract all sorts of flying insects. The fruit is quickly picked off by the birds, especially blackbirds.

Hedgehogs

This is the time of year when you will find hedgehogs awakening from hibernation and on the look out for a mate. You will be able to hear their prickly courtship quite loudly at night. Other times they can be heard snuffling and snorting around the undergrowth searching for food. Their diet consists of worms, beetles, insects, caterpillars and slugs. Generally they are quite happy to amble along from garden to garden, mainly at night. They manage to survive, sometimes with our help, even within our built-up areas.

Practical projects of the month

Make time to create something new in your garden, such as a wall or rock bank.

A natural rocky landscape hosts a selection of plants adapted to dry conditions. This habitat can be recreated in a dry stone wall, rockery, a path, paving, or a rock bank.

A wall provides a sunning spot for butterflies, crevices for spiders and beetles in which to hide, or a place for solitary bees to build a chamber.



A rockery will become the winter hide-out for amphibians, such as frogs, toads and newts and be an attractive addition to any pond. Planting amongst the stones gives added benefit to the creatures there.

Plant with rock plants to give nectar throughout Spring and Autumn. Include plants such as herb robert, heather, purple saxifrage, thyme, cheddar pink, harebell, hebe, rock rose, spring gentian, house leek, London pride, sedium acre, arabis and wall flower.

You may wish to site a bumble bee nest in your rockery and plant with bee flowers such as ivy leaved toadflax, red valerian, aubrietia, forget-me-not, marjoram, bluebell and gorse.

Piquante mushrooms on toast with a twist

This is simple but delicious alternative to cheese on toast, so ideal for a snack or light lunch. The Boursin gives it a sophisticated French flavour whilst the rocket adds piquancy and freshness

10oz Sliced mushrooms

1½oz Butter

1tbs Chopped parsley

4 Slices of your favourite bread

1pkt Boursin cheese 1 Small bag of rocket

Sauté the mushrooms until tender – season to taste before adding the parsley.

Toast your bread before spreading the Bursin on top. Divide the rocket and put on top of the cheese before spooning over the sautéed mushrooms. Serve at once.



Asparagus salad with prosciutto - by Angela Hartnett

The true British asparagus season is very short, lasting for about six weeks from late-April to mid-June, but is well worth waiting for its unbeatable flavour and freshness.

For the dressing

25ml/1fl oz white wine vinegar 150ml/5¼fl oz olive oil salt and freshly ground black pepper

For the asparagus

30-40 asparagus spears, depending on their size olive oil, for drizzling 8 quails' eggs

g quans egg

To serve

8 slices prosciutto

parmesan cheese, cut into shavings with a vegetable peeler

Method

- 1. For the dressing, whisk the vinegar, olive oil and a pinch of salt and some freshly ground black pepper together in a bowl and put to one side.
- 2. For the asparagus, heat a griddle pan and, when hot, drizzle in a little oil. Remove the hard ends of the asparagus. Lay the spears on the griddle and cook in batches for 2-3 minutes, or less if the spears are particularly thin. Do not let the spears get too dark on the griddle they should still be green so that the flavour of the asparagus comes through.
- 3. Transfer the asparagus to a plate, season it with salt and pepper and pour a little of the dressing over. Cover the plate with cling film and allow the asparagus to finish cooking in the steam for a few minutes.
- 4. Meanwhile, heat a little oil in a small non-stick frying pan. Crack the quails' eggs into the pan and fry for 1-2 minutes until cooked.
- 5. Divide the asparagus among four serving plates. Arrange the prosciutto on the side and scatter with the parmesan shavings.
- 6. To serve, place the quails' eggs on top, season with salt and freshly ground black pepper and drizzle with a little of the remaining dressing.
