The Archbishops of Canterbury and York have sent a message to every parish in the country with reference to the challenge which followed the Toronto Conference. PERSONALIA

It is with deep regret that we record the death of Major-General Sir Arthur Mills, C.B., D.S.O. of Enton Green. The General was for many years a regular worshipper at St. Peter's Church and we will miss him very much. Every Remembrance Sunday he took part in the Remembrance Service and the Lesson which he had read so many times was included in his funeral service at Woking Crematorium. Throughout his recent illness he had kept remarkably cheerful.

General Mills had a distinguished military record. He served in the South African War, and in the First World War he was awarded the D.S.O. and two bars, and mentioned in dispatches three times. He served as an A.D.C. to the King from 1933 to 1935.

We extend to Lady Mills and the family our sincere sympathy in their sorrow.

By the death of $\underline{\text{Mr. Robert Readhead}}$, of Great House, Hambledon has lost one of its oldest residents, who was at one

time one of our Churchwardens. For some years Mr. Readhead had been unable to attend our services, but he always took a keen interest in the life of the church and village. Even at the age of ninety-one he would take a short walk along the lane near to his home when the weather permitted - we will miss seeing him there. We sympathise with his family in their bereavement.

Mr. A. E. Clayton Of Bryony Lodge who died suddenly whilst away from home will also be greatly missed by us all. He was a comparatively new-comer to the village, but in the few years he had lived here in retirement he had made many friends. His work as one of our Honorary Auditors was much appreciated. We assure his widow and family of our sympahy in their time of sorrow.

Mr. and Mrs. David Orr of Enton End, who are at present living in New York have written telling us about their life there and send their good wishes to all their friends here.

We are sorry to learn that Mr.J.H. Richardson of Vann Lane is in hospital. The latest news of him is that he is making satisfactory progress and we hope that he will soon be able to return home again. We assure him of our prayers for a speedy recovery.

Hill Top Farm has for many years been a Poultry Farm, and the departure of Miss Tyler from there is an "event" in the life of Hambledon. In recent months thousands of chickens have departed from the land adjacent to the Rectory, and the place has become strangely quiet. We are delighted to know that Miss Tyler is to continue to reside in the village, and we wish her many happy years in her new home.

VILLAGE NOTES

HAMBLEDON PARISH COUNCIL

The stiles in Rockfield have been repaired.

The Invalid Chair for use of all parishioners had been purchased, and a letter of appreciation of the chair had been received by Mrs. Gill, Cherryhurst, applications for use of the chair should be made to either Mrs. M. Hutchins, Cherryhurst, or Mr. A. Francis, The Bungalows, Wormley Lane. The Parish Council had undertaken to pay for the upkeep of the chair.

It was decided to publish the list of Planning applications, (as affecting the Parish of Hambledon) on the public Notice-boards at Hydestile Cross Roads and Village Hall. It was decided to publish a list of persons (with their address and telephone numbers) who would be willing to provide transport to hospital, (in an emergency) for any persons requiring this service, (either day or night). Also if possible to include the address and phone number of the District Nurse.

Agreed to the erection of small 'Cycling Strictly Prohibited" signs on Footpath from Heath Cottage to Village Shop. To erect the Best Kept Village shield on the wall of the Village Shop (with Mr. Evans' permission). To ask for F. P. 190, Vann Lane to Burgate to be cleared.
