October. In spite of pouring rain on the night of October 13th., the opening meeting of the Fellowship was very well attended. Captain Lancelot Spicer, formerly Vice-Chairman of the Royal Common-

wealth Society for the Blind gave us a most interesting account of his recent visit to West Africa which was illustrated by colour transparencies he had taken. We were given an excellent picture of life in that country as well as of the work among the blind. In addition to this we were shown photographs taken by Captain Spicer on board ship during the voyage to Africa, and saw something of the day to day work of the ship's crew. Some remarkable pictures had also been taken of the launching of the life-boats as they set out in mid-ocean to rescue passengers from a blazing liner. Sir John Wenham thanked the speaker for giving us such a delightful lecture. After a short Epilogue refreshments were served. November.

shortly before he went to the Nursing Home, and had been a member of the Parochial Church Council, and held other offices in the Church. He also took a keen interest in Hambledon Almshouses of which he was a Secretary and a Trustee. Since leaving Hambledon he has always taken a keen interest in the Church and village where he has been greatly missed. We thank God for his life and quiet Witness, and assure his family of our sympathies in their bereavement.

Mrs. Ewart Williams of Bonners died recently following an illness which had been very patiently borne. We extend to her husband our sympathies in his sorrow.

Mr. Arthur Luxford's (Hydestile Cottages) sudden death came as a great shock to us all and our thoughts and prayers have been with his widow and family in their sudden bereavement.

Mrs. Cyril Carlé who took an active part in the life of St. Peter's Church when she and her husband were living in Buss's Cottage, has died at their home in the Isle of Wight after a very short illness. Mr. Carlé was Secretary of the Parochial Council just before they left Hambledon, and we remember him at this time.

HAMBLEDON CHURCH FELLOWSHIP: Following the success of our coach outing in May last, when over 70 participated in a visit to Littlecote Manor, it is proposed that a similar outing be arranged for members and their friends in 1967 to PENSHURST PLACE (Kent) on SATURDAY 20th MAY. TWELVE EASY RULES FOR PARENTS: (The "rules" were sent to parents by the Police Department of Houston, Texas).

- 1. Begin at infancy to give the child everything he wants. In this way he will grow up to believe that the world owes him a living.
- 2. When he picks up bad words, laugh at him. This will make him think he's cute.
- 3. Never give him any spiritual training. Wait until he is twenty-one and then let him "Decide for himself".
- Avoid the use of the word "wrong". It may develop a guilt complex. This will condition him to believe, later, when he steals a car and is arrested, that Society is against him and he is being persecuted.
- 5. Pick up everything he leaves lying around books, shoes, clothing. Do everything for him so that he will be experienced in throwing all responsibility on to others.
- 6. Let him read any printed matter he can get his hands on. Be careful that the silverware and the drinking glasses are sterilised, but let his mind feast on garbage.
- 7. Quarrel frequently in the presence of your children. In this way they will not be too shocked when the home is broken up later.
- 8. Give a child all the spending money he wants. Never let him earn his own. Why should he have things as tough as you had?
- Satisfy his every craving for food, drink and comfort. See that every sensual desire is gratified. Denial may lead to harmful frustration.
- 10. Take his part against neighbours, teachers, policemen. They are all prejudiced against your child.
- 11. When he gets into real trouble, apologize for yourself by saying "I never could do anything with him!"
- 12, Prepare for a life of grief. You will be likely to have it! (Contributed)
