THE REV. JOHN POULTON will preach on Sunday, Nov. 4th, at 11.0 a.m. with Mission Unlimited in mind his visit is of particular interest. He has written a number of articles in the Diocesan Leaflet on the subject. Mr. Poulton is Research and Development Officer for the Archbishops' Council on Evangelism. He has served with the C.M.S., in Africa and became Director of the Church in Uganda Radio Centre. Before taking his present post he was Research Secretary of the World Association for Christian Broadcasting.

C.M.S. SUNDAY - November 18th, 1978

Church Missionary Society supporting parishes in the deaneries of Guildford and Godalming will be inviting C.M.S. missionaries to preach in their churches on this Sunday. We look forward to the visit of Miss E.L.Rose who has served as a missionary in Africa and also on the Home Staff of the Society. A few details about Miss Rose:-

Born at St. Alban's. Before the war she worked as a secretary in her father's firm of stained-glass artists. Was accepted by the C.M.S., and sailed for Uganda in April 1947. Her first location was as secretary-accountant in the education office of the Anglican Church in Uganda. Supervised the Buganda Church Schools. Later she served at the Bishop Tucker Theological College at Mukono and was involved in training Ordinands' Wives, and in visiting Mothers' Union branches in the Diocese of Namirembe.

In 1957 she became assistant to the C.M.S. Regional Secretary in Namirembe, with a part-time assignment to the Mothers' Union in the diocese - later returning as a full-time worker. In 1965 the Archbishop asked her to undertake work at a Provincial level, concentrating on the training of African Organising Workers in all the dioceses.

Miss Rose has had a long and interesting period of service in Africa, and is now engaged in deputation work in this area. We hope that you will make a special effort to be with us when she visits Hambledon. She will preach at both 11.0 a.m. and 6.30 p.m.
