THE RECTOR WRITES

On October 8 there was to be read publicly in every Church of England a letter to us all from our Archbishops. It made a forthright call for prayer and action to maintain the clergy strength of the Church at least at its present level.

Here in Hambledon we have not hitherto felt the danger; but most small villages have. There are now several thousand fewer clergy than used to be available, and inevitably parishes with small populations have suffered first. So it is now almost normal for villages to be joined together in groups of two or three.

The Archbishops' important letter has been written out of conviction, and in faith, and against the trend of much recent thinking. Many influential church leaders have felt that it is impossible to maintain the number of clergy even at the present lower level, partly because fewer men are offering themselves, but even more because nationwide there is not enough money available to pay for as many clergy as in the past; they feel we must fearlessly continue to join smaller parishes, and arrange for more pastoral work to be done by lay people.

The Archbishops' conviction is that there is indeed much work that can and should be done by lay people, but that full time clergy are needed as well; and we must pray that God will call them.

I hope the Archbishops' letter will not be quickly forgotten, and that we shall pray to the Lord of the Church along these lines.

Mitchell, is published here in the hope that some of our readers may be able to offer help.

"We have recently been working very hard and with modest success in getting our disabled residents out of the Home as often as possible on visits to places and events of interest. Because of their disablement it is necessary for an 'escort', normally a member of our care staff, to accompany residents on such outings. Due to our acute difficulty in getting staff it looks very much that these most popular outings will have to be curtailed through lack of escorts.

The duties of escort on these outings are relatively simple:-

a) Riding in the back of the ambulance with the residents and steadying wheelchairs when going round corners, etc.

b) Assisting with pushing wheelchairs where necessary

c) Toileting residents if and when necessary. Such arrangements are not complicated, and guidance is given by our care staff.

d) Helping with residents packed meals when these are taken.

It may be that there are some members of your congregation (e.g. active pensioners) who have the time to spare to undertake this most Christian service to their more unfortunate brothers or sisters, and
