BEST KEPT VILLAGE (SURREY) COMPETITION.

The following notes on Hambledon Village and Village Hall have been sent following the above competition:

VILLAGE.

Hambledon is commended for having reached the final of the small villages section of the competition. The Committee consider that the population of the village, apart from the hospitals, is less than 1,500 and it has therefore classed Hambledon as a small village. The Churchyard was outstanding. The playing field and village hall exterior were very good. There were a number of faults which prevented the village from gaining a place in the first three. A litter bin was seen upside down on the Green, and there was a lot of litter everywhere. The pond was full of rubbish. Hedges, verges, Village green and 'bus shelter could have been better.

VILLAGE HALL

The hall is well used and generally tidy and well kept and only just missed going forward for further judging. On part of the side wall outside the gentlemen's lavatory the earth was above the damp proof course and should be removed. The soakaway outside the kitchen door was blocked, but the inspection was made after heavy rain. The handle was off the door of the Ladies' lavatory. The judges thought that four heavy mats, especially those between the cooker and the sink might be an accident hazard.
