Specially now we recall his uncomplaining cheerfulness, histhought for others, his humour even in the face of his own pains and frustations. To Lydis, who has been such a rock throughout, and to his family we send our warmest greetings now. May God strengthen them all.

Col. E.A.S. OLDHAM lived in Chiddingfold, and was a member and former church officer there. Latterly, however, he liked also to come to Hambledon to join us at Morning Prayer, and we shall miss him from his place just under the pulpit. His death was sudden, but not entirely unexpected. Canon Charles Oldham was a relative, and conducted the funeral service at Chiddingfold Parish Church. We specially remember Mrs Oldham now in our prayers.
