

MISS MOLLY HIDE

Many will remember Molly Hide who was at one time a regular member of the St Peter's congregation until poor sight caused her to give up driving her motor car.

She was captain of the England women's cricket team from 1937 until 1954, an era when home Test matches commanded crowds of up to 15,000. As a captain she never contemplated playing for a draw when there was the slightest sniff of victory. She was as demanding of her players as she was of herself and could be particularly ruthless with her bowlers.

As well as captaining England for 17 years, Molly also turned out regularly for her local club at Mitcham Green. She became president of the Women's Cricket Association in 1973 and continued to be a devoted member of Surrey.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON GROUP



This is a wonderful result, especially in view of the very large number of entrants.








HAMBLEDON VILLAGE SHOP
