GUILDFORD CATHEDRAL LECTURES - OCTOBER 1972

on Wednesdays at 8.15 p.m. "Our Minds under Attack"

By way of various media, press, paper-backs, radio and television, we are bombarded by varieties of religions, political ideologies and all kinds of "isms". How do our minds react? What will win our loyalty? How can Christianity be "got across"?

4th October: "The Mechanism of Brain Washing and Conversion", by Dr. William Sargant, F.R.C.P. - illustrated by film, slides and sound-recordings.

Dr. Sargant is the well-known psychiatrist and world authority on physical treatments of the mind. Author of "Battle for the Mind" which, since publication in 1957, has sold one quarter of a million copies.

11th October: "Which Way of Life?" by Professor John Ferguson, Dean of Arts in the Open University, formerly Professor in the University of Ibadan, Nigeria, and in the University of Minnesota, U.S.A. Author and broadcaster.

18th October: "Communicating Christianity in the Secular City" by the Lord Bishop of Middleton, formerly Sheffield Diocesan

Missioner to industry. Author of "Church and People in an Industrial City" and "Encounter with Modern Society".

HAMBLEDON VILLAGE SCRAP BOOK EXTRACTS (Cont.)

Here is another item of interest connected with the village.

One of the most interesting houses in the village is VANN, although it is not strictly part of Hambledon. Vann Lane (the name meaning "a marshy place") was in the manor and parish of Godalming, and is at present in the ecclesiastical parish of Busbridge (carved out of the old Godalming parish), which extends down to a few yards short of Pockford Bridge. The Vann property extends up to, but does not enter, the ecclesiastical parish of Hambledon. It is included in the civil parish of Hambledon, but that has no antiquity. (The boundaries of the ecclesiastical parishes of Busbridge, Dunsfold and Hambledon are at present in process of revision and it is suggested that the ecclesiastical boundary should be the same as the civil).

Mr. Caroe, the owner of Vann, writes: "Vann once belonged to Ralph Jennings, grandfather of Sarah, Duchess of Marlborough, but he sold it to Thomas Cowper in 1590. At the Restoration it belonged to the Clarke family, and Anthony Clarke (who for seven years also owned the most interesting cottage "Shaftoes", 250 yards up the lane, which has fascinating title deeds beginning with a 1,000 year lease dated 1625 for 1/- a year) sold Vann in 1689 to John Childe or Child, who was Mayor of Guildford in 1676, 1681 and 1691, and died in 1701. He owned property all round Guildford, and evidently built the south end of

Vann, which can be dated stylistically to just before 1700.

His town house was "Guildford House" in the High Street. His son, also John, sold Vann to John GREENHILL in 1722, but he evidently let it to a tenant, WILLIAM FORD, because when the latter died on 30th April 1755, aged 80, he was buried in Hambledon Churchyard (his tombstone is the oldest dated stone) and was specified to be "of Vann", because Vann was not in Hambledon William Ford had a son called John, who was born in 1723, and he is also described as "of Vann" on his tombstone; he died in 1809 at PARK HATCH. John Greenhill, the owner of Vann, entailed it in 1734 to Peter, son of Sir Peter and Sarah Anna MYERS, through whom it passed to Peter's daughter, Sarah GELDART.

The centre of the house is Elizabethan, and contains an interesting early seventeenth century wrought iron cooking crane and a rather poor Jacobean overmantel, inscribed WPA 1619. A small brick-built wing was added about 1740. The bath and cartshed (now a corridor) were functional agricultural buildings dating probably from the late seventeenth or eighteenth century."

Mr. Caroe's father, W. D. Caroe, made additions in 1908-9, and the whole building is scheduled as of historic interest. More details (chiefly of a reputed Manor of Vann rather than of the house) can be obtained in the Victoria County History of Surrey, Vol. III, pages 35-36. Mr. Caroe excavated one of the best preserved structures of an Elizabethan glasshouse, in a copse 200 yards to the east of the house.
